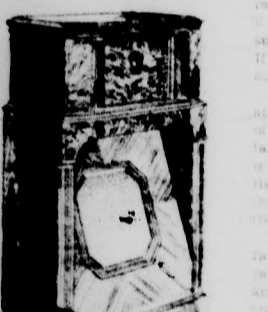

The Cut System

We don't know what mental gymnastic Blue Key went through to reach the witty and ponderous decision that what forces if any they were trying to please. But their solution of the much discussed cut system was certainly a blank cartridge and did not at all represent the general student attitude or that of the professors. Using this system the student receiving perfect attendance should receive a good grade in keeping with the grade roll policy.

As it stands it offers no virtue over the present system and offers more complications and even more delay. It involves added administration and forces the student with a mediocre cut to take three times as much time to verify it.

Even though the old system has become practically a tradition, ideas on education are rapidly having more stress on student responsibility and self-reliance.

We are now being as a class A institution. And the institutions that maintain or even approximate state's present plan are decidedly in the minority. After all we are a high college, not a high school.

Granted that the undergrad men is going to the high school in size and number and should be supervised, but it is necessary to make him realize that it really is up to him whether he sinks or swims. The upmanship on the other hand should take on some of his characteristics of the sea.

The general opinion seems to be that if we are going to be a high school in size and number, we must be a high school in spirit. We are the one in direct contact with the student and understand the latter's limitations and abilities. By leaving the cut question entirely with the instructor, the student's role now in fact, which previously can not be applied, is to a large body of people with all their individual differences will be eliminated. After all the rules of mass production can not be applied to higher education without destroying its very purpose.

To anyone bored with life here is a plan. And what a plan. Here in a space three months in a hospital as an orderly in the operating room. After seeing human beings constantly cut-up with the surgeons' knives or vainly patched for a few more years, others, just as good as they for the next step. Three months on a newspaper with the scientific attitude discarded and the human interest side paramount. After realizing to the utmost the faculty of your knowledge get permission from your political friends to spend one month in the execution block of a prison where you will discover the meaning of a fellow being waiting to die and the sweetness of your own freedom and life. Can this comparison with a month in a medical colony. In this Rousseau-like background the reality of physical well-being, the highest contemplation of just living will suddenly dawn on you and provide a fitting climax to your program.

Lumpkin," brings out the personality of the woman by the use of the larger more subtle color tones, number 92. The "Sigmund Freud" portrays this man in an amusing and very nature. One, Number 93, entitled "A Study in White," is a very interesting sketch in which Colt blends the various shades of gray and steel blue, producing a pleasing portrait. In the portrait sketch, "Miss Genevieve Jones," number 88, the different shades of blue and orange are mingled to produce a feeling of warmth and beauty, making this portrait seem lifelike and exact.

Among the landscapes, No. 96, "East End Afternoon," is delightful with its rich colors and skillful grouping.

The one still life in the exhibit, No. 90, is excellent and presents the more modern trend of the artist.
