To us, that such a situation is lamentable would be putting it mildly. We like to have it known that the institution is on a par scholastically with another school of its size. FARMERS HEAR GOV. BRUCKER

Capacity Audience Told of Proposed Governmental Consolidation.

Speaking on present governmental conditions in Michigan with especial regard to the proposed consolidation of township and county governments of the state, Gov. Wilbur M. Brucker last night addressed the large audience of Farmers Week visitors which filled Demonstration Hall to capacity.

Gov. Brucker was introduced by Pres. H. B. Shaw and by the complimentary President Shaw, who had had much to say for Michigan State college during his long period of service to the institution.

During his period of office as governor of the state, Brucker pointed out that he has been faced with a challenge by the existing economic conditions while attempting to carry out his program of governmental reorganization without inflicting hardship on those institutions and officers of the state who are affected. But in spite of the difficulty, economy in the administration of these institutions has effected and has added greatly to bringing Michigan out of the economic morass created by any one involved. Within the next year, Gov. Brucker through these and other similar operations of economy expects to see the state's present debt cut in half.

Declaring his opposition to the consolidation of township and county governments on the basis that rural economy would be effected by Gov. Brucker pointed out that such a condition would nullify the administration of present township business by county paid officials and not be an efficient or democratic one under the present system in which township problems are dealt with by people more intimately connected with such local affairs and consolidation would meet with his favor only in a few isolated and sparsely populated sections where such a merger would be beneficial. Township government is second only to state government in its importance and can operate more effectively by closer cooperation with the state. Expense should be cut by eliminating other expenses which are unnecessary than those incurred by the administration of township government.

In closing his address of the evening which preceded and followed the main address, Gov. Brucker took the opportunity to compliment the administration of the college for their cooperation in the economy plan of the state by accepting budget cuts without complaint.

Other events of the evening which preceded and followed the main address were a play by the college band under the direction of Leonard Falcone, a livestock parade of college owned animals, an exhibition of a trained horse and trained dog, sheep shearing contest, horse pulling contest, and special features by college physical education and military students.

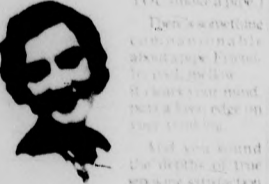

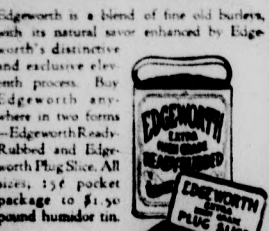

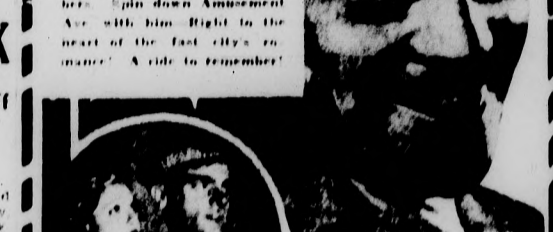
