## MICHIGAN HERE TOMORROW IN YEAR'S BIG COURT ENCOUNTER; WOLVERINES FAVERED TO WIN

**Coach Ben Van Alstyne's Men Show Poor Form in Downing Kalamazoo College, 17-9; State Will be Seeking Revenge for Early Season Reverse; Daniels Expected to Star.**

After downing the Hornets from Kalamazoo college last Saturday night by a score of 17 to 9, the Spartans have been seriously preparing for the highlight of the basketball season, the home game with the University of Michigan tomorrow night in Demonstration hall.

Although the team was unable to get going in the Kalamazoo game, Spartan followers have not taken this as a reversal of form. It was obvious that the team was hampered by the condition of the floor which had been in use during Farmers' Week. The "team" was also handicapped inasmuch as practice sessions last week were held in the Boys' Vocational Gymnasium.

The Wolverines will take the floor tomorrow night as the favorites, not because of a better record but because of the humiliating drubbing that they handed the Spartans earlier in the season. While the visitors have a team of individual stars, they haven't come up to their usual standard this year.

Coach Chapman has, however, gotten the most out of his boys in spite of injuries, indiscretions, and sickness. Norm Daniels who has alternated at center and forward ranks third in scoring honors in the conference with a total of 80 points while his mate Eyleland is in eighth place with 31 points.

Coach Chapman has uncovered a real find in Charmer photom who made his debut in the Michigan State Michigan game this year. He has taken part in every game this year collecting a total of 31 points. His specialty is playing them off the backboard in the same way that Benny Osterbaud used to who starred with the Wolverines. Although Weisz has been out of the game for about three weeks because of sickness he is expected to be in form by Tomorrow night.

In their conference games this year the Wolverines have won four out of six and have a firm grip on third place. Their recent defeat by Northwestern was the most heart-breaking loss of the season. After leading the Wildcats for almost the second half, they were beaten in the last minute of play by a score of 31 to 30.

State should be at top form when they enter Demonstration hall tomorrow night. The fact that the Spartans are playing on their own door and that the reserve strength has finally proved itself capable of varsity competition are all in favor of the home team.

The last 20 days or so before the game will be Wednesdays and with the return of the snow there the work seemed easier. The Varsity team little difficulty managing the snow as though it were to serve and frequent.

It was learned last night that Ray Aderholdt, Wolverine star of last year, would be eligible in time for Saturday's game. He isn't likely however that he will be used since he hasn't been a basketball dog for some time. The game will be State's first game in two weeks. ### State Coaches Ask Grid Change

Instead of changing the rules to make football a safer game, Ralph Young, director of athletics and Coach James H. Crowley have advised changing of the uniform.

While both regard the injury and repeated death from football as unfortunate, but they believe that the situation has been over emphasized. Crowley has been vigorous in opposition to the attempts which have been made to modify the kick-off and eliminate the flying wedge. They also oppose the idea of kicking back the ball kick-off from a tee which would slow up the game for the spectators and detract from interesting phases under the present system.

The type of uniform which Young and Crowley propose is one that would not only take into consideration the wearer but also the opponent. The fiber layers of the present equipment are designed mainly to protect the wearer although they are liable to cause injuries to the opponent.

The two men suggest that the headgear, knee and toe pads be changed. Instead of being constructed of a hard damping material a sponge-like substance could be substituted.

#### Michigan Game

Tomorrow night Michigan State's basketball team will gain sweet revenge or take another beating.

The Spartans looked extremely good playing against Kalamazoo College last Saturday. If they exhibit the same kind of ball in the Wolverine game it is safe to say the Michigan team will score an easy victory. In every department of play State showed the poorest form of the season and it was only the sharp shooting eyes of Gerald Boot, McAdams and Randy Hobart that pulled a 17 to 9 victory out of the fire. McAdams made eight points and Hobart six.

The Wolverines are coming to East Lansing for the second time in 10 years and as is always the case when the Mags and Blue five appear here a capacity crowd is expected to attend. The Spartans will be out to avenge the 27 to 5 defeat suffered at Ann Arbor earlier in the season.

Twelve Spartan track men left this morning for Morgantown, West Virginia where they will compete in the West Virginia relays tomorrow afternoon and evening. Conches, Young, Chastell and Brown account named the team.

One Spartan will be making the trip with a definite purpose in mind. The man is Clark Chamberlain and he will attempt to better the record which he established on his trip there last year. Chamberlain ran the mile on the southern track last year with Brecker of Penn State on his heels.
