FOREIGN MOVIES WILL BE SHOWN BY ARTS GROUP

New Local Organization Will Sponsor Presentation of "Jeanne d'Arc"
FILM IS MASTERPIECE
Seven Arts Club Will Continue Policy of Showing Fine Foreign Productions

Presentation of the first foreign motion picture to be shown on this campus has been adopted as the opening move in a cultural program to be sponsored by the Seven Arts Club, newly organized legitimate organization, it was announced today. National popularity of foreign films, noted for their high artistic qualities, is said to have motivated the group in its decision.

The French silent film, "Jeanne d'Arc," produced in 1925 and considered by critics as one of the finest ever created from the standpoint of photography and character portrayal, has been chosen as the first vehicle for the new Michigan showing. Definite plans for the special appearance of the film have not been made as yet though it is expected that it will be held within the next three or four weeks. The picture will probably take place in the West Building lecture room at a seasonal time.

Support Many Films
According to members of the society many foreign films have been imported since last summer and the group has been impressed with the artistic merit displayed in comparison with the purely commercial appeal of American pictures. "Jeanne d'Arc" is said to be distinctly above the usual dull French films shown several years ago on American hunting circuits.

The vogue of artistic foreign cinema has been widely acclaimed by outstanding American dramatic critics. "Jeanne d'Arc" is said to be one of the best of the world's greatest films. It deals with the life of the French heroine Joan of Arc and depicts an 11th Century German myth.

An attempt is being made to obtain loans for the film which will be shown at the Michigan State College Institute of Music. The scheme approved by the college administration has the enthusiastic backing of a faculty committee appointed by President Robert S. Shaw. It is composed of Prof. L. C. Though the penalties seem a trifle severe, enough leeway is built in to be allowed so that any intelligent student should be able to keep him self in good standing. That was the main question the News was interested in, a more liberal allowance of 60%.

In summary it may be said that the faculty committee has done an honest and fair minded piece of work. The News has not more than half way in its proposal for revision, but more so than was hoped for.

ONE PLANK GONE

In doing so it writes: "At the end of the first chapter of successful editorial campaign in the waning days of this administration it appears unlikely that any further steps will be possible toward completion of the other planks. FRESHMEN WIN SATURDAY MEET

Grajewski and Daggett Swim to Unofficial Records

The freshmen won the interclass swimming meet last Saturday by edging out their nearest competitors, the sophomores, 15 to 10. Several outstanding performances were witnessed and some of the existing records broken.

Grajewski, freshman star, lowered the pool record for the 200 free style by covering the distance in 2:24.8. Daggett, another freshman, swam the 100 yard free style in 5:0.3. Neither time will go up as the freshmen record as both swimmers are ineligible, but Grajewski's time will stand as a pool record.

Descriptive Boglet Sent Membership Committee; Group to Act by Spring 1933.

CASTELL HAS HOPEFUL IN TRACK CANDIDATE

Miles W. Castell, assistant coach of track at Michigan State college, likes pole vaulting. The why? Castell's mentor has devoted much time and study to development of pole vaulting style, and the feats are accomplished by Sparran vaulters indicate that Castell's efforts have borne fruit.

Castell's first charge of note was Harold McAtee who polished off a brilliant career by winning the national junior A. U. championship at Denver two years ago. When McAtee passed Castell turned to Robert Olsen, tall Michigan youth, open did not fit the height, attained by his predecessor but he was good enough to compete in the latest college company and walk off with his share of honors. The injury kept him of the cage quad because of the quick starts and turns that are necessary in the court game. But pole vaulting is a straight-away running proposition and the injured member has shown no signs of weakness under the strains imposed. Castell almost believes that Holcomb will, one of these days, call over at his bar at a height that will rewrite the national ranking.

It is interesting to know though that State men and women start working very far away after they graduate here, and that most of them may be found within a radius of five or six hundred miles.
