MAKE EFFORT TO FORESTALL FLU EPIDEMIC

Increasing Amount of Sickness on Campus Makes Stringent Measures Necessary.
INFIRMARY IS CROWDED
Administration Takes Steps to Stop Spread of Disease; Holidays Declared

Last minute developments in a campus-wide fight to forestall the threat of a local influenza epidemic were announced today. Fraternities and societies to postpone social affairs, perfection of plans to set up hospital wards in unused dormitories, and dismissal of Saturday morning classes.

Confidential estimates of the amount of sickness to be found on the campus today were based on an average of one-third falling off in classroom attendance. Attaches at the college hospital report the infirmary has been crowded to capacity for the last four days and that two additional physicians have been added to the staff.

In view of the fact that classes are excused all day Monday on account of Washington's birthday, it

SATURDAY, MONDAY CLASSES DISMISSED

Classes are excused Saturday morning and all day Monday. This was announced by the college administration in a meeting yesterday.

Action to close school tomorrow was taken at the instigation of Dr. R. M. Olin, college health officer, to prevent the spread of influenza epidemic Monday through Friday. It is expected that national holidays falling either before or after a week-end will be extended to the student body.

It was felt that the early closing of school Friday night and the holding of all social functions connected with the college during the week-end would allow a majority of the student body to leave the campus by next Tuesday.

At the instigation of Dr. R. M. Olin, head of the college health service, the social committee met yesterday to discuss any social or athletic functions during the week-end. Later Dr. Olin asked the committee to reconsider its action in view of the fact that many houses had arranged for outside guests, and would be harmed by the ruling. He also suggested the abandonment of Saturday classes.

As a result it was voted to "urgently request" all societies to postpone their parties. A check by the Michigan State News last night of eight societies scheduled for parties showed that only two had voted cancellation of their affairs. The Sigma Phi fraternity decided early last night to forego an open house party and Kappa Kappa Gamma has postponed its formal to March 19. Members of Alpha Gamma Phi, Phi Epsilon, Phi Kappa Phi and Mary Mayo Hall all planning term formal have decided to continue.

FIRE DAMAGES EMMONS HOME

Sunday Blaze Seriously Injures East Lansing Residence of Professor.

The home of L. C. Emmons, research professor in institution management, was seriously damaged by the early Sunday morning fire to the extent of several thousand dollars. It is believed to have started in a paper chute in the lower part of the house.

Prof. Emmons retired at 1 o'clock and at that time reported that everything appeared to be all right. Shortly after retiring he was awakened by the sound of crackling flames and the smell of burning wood. He at once warned the rest of the family and ran to the house next door to call the fire department. Both the East Lansing and Lansing departments responded to the call. Shortly after he left the house a terrific explosion, one of the French doors between two of the rooms on the main floor. The members of the family were taken care of at the home of Dean Ward Giltner.

Pire Capt. Murle Crox of 308 Center street, was overcome by smoke and fumes and was taken to the hospital but was removed to his home later in the day.

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MICHIGAN STATE'S CAGE TEAM PLAYS SENSATIONAL GAMES TO WIN SUCCESSIVE TRIUMPHS

Michigan, Marquette, and Detroit Fall Before Spartans as Contests Go Into Overtime Periods; Pinneo Proves Hero in Remarkable Comeback; Xavier Saturday Night

By winning three overtime games in five nights, the Spartans made it ten consecutive victories. The Michigan game was won by a score of 14 to 13, in two six-minute overtime periods. The Marquette game, by a score of 25 to 23, also in two extra sessions, while with the University of Detroit required but one additional period. The Spartans came from behind to beat the Titans, 25 to 21.

Spartan Side-Lines BY VAN

Michigan State gained revenge over the early season defeat at the hands of the Wolverines by handing them a 14 to 13 victory. The game, played in the gymnasium, was a hard fought, exciting contest, marked by brilliant play on both sides. The first period of the game seemed like a mere repetition of the earlier game at Van Arbor, both teams being unable to score. At the end of the first period, Michigan led by a score of 4 to 3.

No extra Michigan State basketball team can beat the Spartans until they win the Michigan and Marquette games. The Michigan and Marquette games demonstrated that Coach Ben Van Alstyne's men have that extra something which is needed to win a game in overtime periods. The outstanding exhibition of Frank Morrow playing was on last Wednesday night, however, when the Spartans came from behind to beat a cocky U. of D. cage team 25 to 21. And State was really behind! With 15 minutes to play the score stood 26 to 9 in the Titans favor.

VAN ALSTYNE SICK

Due to the fact that Coach Ben E. Van Alstyne is confined to his bed with the prevalent flu, the basketball team will be placed in charge of Art Hagg, freshman coach and star of last year's team, when they travel to Cincinnati to meet Xavier on Friday.
