On the campus is an institution that is exceedingly popular but eminently pernicious and for which a moratorium is decidedly in order. That is the institution of honorary societies. It may be heresy to cast aspersions at the sanctity of these childish organizations, but the thoughtful will find in them the element that is preventing Michigan State from approaching a proper spirit of service. The same is true of the faculty, in the main. Faculty men will not serve on committees without great wailings and not act in extra capacities without asking payment. As long as the Spartans, student and faculty, have that attitude, State will never benefit by unselfish service, never reap the profits of a unified mass working to common purposes.

SPARTANS FACE MARQUETTE U

Thinclad Squad Will Attempt to Break Six-Year Jinx at Milwaukee.

Michigan State's indoor track team will journey to Marquette University next Tuesday in an attempt to break a jinx that has existed for the last six years. Marquette has not been able to win an indoor meet in the Spartan gymnasium during that period, neither has State been able to win in Marquette territory.

The two teams have always been more or less evenly matched, and the familiarity with the home gymnasium has been the deciding factor in walking off with the highest honor. During the last six years these teams have met just six times, each school having three victories engraved upon the bronze trophy which the Milwaukee Rotary club gave to the two schools to battle over. The meet should be close although Marquette is conceded some edge because of experienced men. HoComb may be able to do some post-vaulting for State. If he is unable to break the jinx, perhaps the two mile and Pongrace can give someone a hard race for first in the half mile. Pongrace must win the half mile event if State wishes to come near to the score Marquette will pile up in other events. Marquette and Michigan State freshmen will also cash this week via telegraph. King Winter Visits Near East; Local Station Has New Records

New Mark for Light Snowfall on Books to Date; Expect Record.

The winter of 1931 and 1932 up to the present time has caused some new records to be entered in the files of the weather bureau, according to D. A. Seeley, meteorologist and director of the weather station. Mr. Seeley stated that since 1863, when systematic filing of weather conditions was begun at the college, only one winter compares with the present one. This other apparent departure from normal conditions occurred in 1879 and '80 when the month of January averaged 33 degrees warmer than January of 1932. However, November and December of 1879 were cooler than the corresponding months of the present season, so this is probably the warmest winter this section has experienced since some time before 1863.

here is 29.6 inches, and only 12 inches have been measured up to the present time. Mr. Seeley believes that the only plausible scientific explanation of the unusual weather is the changing of the routes taken by air currents flowing between the poles and the equator. This theory is substantiated by the fact that parts of Asia are experiencing some of the coldest weather in their histories. Mr. Seeley refrained from predicting future sunshine or skating for he claims that with present information weather may not be scientifically determined with any degree of accuracy for more than 48 hours in advance.

SPARTAN TRAVELERS ROUTED BY MARQUETTE LAST NIGHT TO END SEASON OF ONLY FIVE LOSSES

Four Consecutive Overtime Games Claimed to Have Weakened State Basketeers: Co-Captains Dee Pinneo and Randy Boeskool Play Last Game.

State took it on the chin last night for the third time within a week when Marquette won the return game at Milwaukee by a score of 43 to 18. This is the worst defeat that the Spartans have suffered during the season. Earlier in the week the Spartans were downed by Xavier in the fourth consecutive overtime game 31 to 24 and on Tuesday they suffered the second defeat from Notre Dame, 28 to 20.

Xavier Game

State went to Cincinnati after playing three strenuous overtimes in five evenings and handicapped by the loss of their coach. From all reports it was one of those rough and tumble affairs which Spartan followers became acquainted with earlier in the season when they placed host to visiting eastern teams. The referee set a new high at ejecting State's first team for personal fouls when Jan Bernard was removed from the game. All told Xavier was given 18 opportunities to score from the charity line and it helped in no little measure to swell their total.

At the end of the half the home team was leading State 16 to 11. Throughout most of the second half State was trailing by two or three points. It wasn't until the last few minutes when the Spartans took to the attack and when Dee Pinneo again forced a game into extra session when he found the basket for the necessary two points to make 24-21. In the overtime the Spartans were exhausted and sheer count alone kept them on the floor. During this overtime period Xavier amassed a total of seven points while State was held scoreless.

Notre Dame Game

After a two night rest, the Spartans engaged Notre Dame, a team that has won 11 consecutive games and is in line for the national basketball championship. While State lost 28 to 20, they displayed a much better brand of basketball than exhibited at Cincinnati. The Irish jumped into a three point lead at the outset and no one were the Spartans able to take up the gap.

The Pinneo came back on the floor and was tied with Ed Kratoch of Notre Dame for scoring honors with 8 points. Twelfth Annual Indoor Track Carnival to Be Staged Here Tomorrow.

There are 115 entries in date.

Clark Chamberlain is slated to run the mile for State, an event which has no competition in the state that can match the Spartan runner. Practically all of the Spartan track men will see action in the meet. Liberty and Bath have good chances in both the 40 yard dash and low hurdles. Holcomb has been slated to do the pole vaulting but it is doubtful if his injured foot will permit his participation. Latavette will run the 40 yard dash.

The two mile relay is to be the feature of the meet. Michigan State, Western State, Detroit City College, and Ypsilanti have teams entered in the event. Ypsilanti is favored to take first although they will be hard pressed by State.

The proceeds from the meet are to be presented to the American Olympic committee as State's contribution towards the Olympic game. Student may use their book.

STATE MATMEN MEET CHAMPS

Indiana Threatens to Take Last Dual Meet as Flu Epidemic Weakens Spartans.

Michigan State's wrestlers will engage in their last dual meet of the season against the University of Indiana, Big Ten champions at Bloomington, Ind. tomorrow night.

Due to an epidemic of flu which has considerably weakened the Spartan grapplers they will not be at the peak of their strength against the Hoosiers. Indications are that Floyd Austin, 118 pound star, and Paul Jensen, 155 pound representative, will be unable to compete due to illness. In this case, Mardess and Rajkovich will see action.

In spite of the fact that the Spartans have come through the season so far undefeated, they go into the meet with Indiana the underdog.

The Hoosiers have been conference champions for the past two years and possess an enviable record this season. They have won five consecutive meets, four by shut-out score. Northwestern scored on them in their most recent meet, but at the same time was defeated, 26 to 10. They boast in their ranks a national champion in Bob Jones, heavyweight. Several of the team members are also Big Ten titleholders.

CHAMBERLAIN FIFTH IN NATIONAL

The National A. A. U. three mile run, staged at Madison Square Garden in New York city last Monday, found two Spartans crossing the finish line for fourth and fifth places. Clark Chamberlain took fifth although hampered by a bad cold.

Tom Otley, the blond-haired yearling, finished fourth. Otley ran under the colors of the Meadexbrook Athletic club of Philadelphia. First place in the run was captured by George Leonard of the New York A. C. His time was 14:26.6, an excellent bit of running on the part of Leonard. Otley finished in 14:29 and Chamberlain with the time of 14:40.

There were 15 participants in the meet. Zepp of Michigan Normal finished seventh.
