SPARTAN BASEBALL PLAYERS TRAIN HARD IN PREPARATION FOR SOUTHERN COMPETITION

Kobussen Experience Weakness in Comerfield, Catching Berths; Morris Favored to Replace Burnett in Backstop Position; Three Left-handed Bats.

With the spring training season in Michigan only a few weeks away, the race for jobs on the Michigan State baseball team is developing rapidly. 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
