KOBSEN END HOME SCHEDULE WITH WIN FROM CHICAGO AND GO ON ROAD FOR THREE GAMES

Spartans Play Michigan State Normal Today, Meet Notre Dame Saturday, and Western State Wednesday; Griffin Ends Chicago Game With Homer.

Three games remain on the Spartan baseball schedule this season. Two of these will be played this week, while the third will be played next Wednesday.

The game scheduled with the Michigan State Normal college at Apollonia for yesterday afternoon was postponed on account of rain and will be played at the Huron field this afternoon, weather permitting.

Saturday the Kobens will end their endeavor to make it two straight over Notre Dame when they meet the Irish team at South Bend. The last game will be played at Kalamazoo against Western State Normal June 8.

The entire squad left East Lansing this morning for Vicksburg, where the State team will endeavor to avenge a defeat at the hands of the Hurons earlier in the season. Michigan State Normal having but only nine game-time starts, is favored to win the game on the basis of its showing to date.

Michigan State Huron southpaw who fumbled the Michigan State team in the first game, will probably be on the mound again for the Hurons. In case the left-hander is the opposing pitcher it is doubtful that State will be able to win since posters have always been a menace for the team throughout the year.

Only an ending ball seldom is heard outside of extra Innings, saved the Spartans in their game against Chicago Monday.

Charles Griffin, who had pitched a good game but had allowed six runs through the inability of his mates to support him at critical moments, whaled a home run in the ninth with McCashin on base to win the game.



Young Takes Sixteen Men to Marquette for Two Day Races.

The Central Intercollegiate track meet to be staged in Milwaukee tomorrow will find State represented by all thirteen who scored points in the State Intercollegiates.

Notre Dame was last year's winner and still the favorite to hold their winning streak to five straight victories by defeating the University of Detroit and Detroit City College at the metropolis last week.

But the Spartans, unaccustomed to earlier defeat, by turning back the City College quarter, 90 to 86, The victory over the Pioneers was the best of the season.

Bob Mitchell started the State in the Detroit City match, winning three points in the sprints and combining with Bob Macchi to win 250 in the foursome. Capt. Arnold Houghfield won his singles match 2 to 1.

The Spartans are in good shape to face the stiff competition that awaits them in the form of such men as McEachern, a colored boy from Marquette who recently ran the 250 in 30.4, two-tenths of a second under the world record, and that of Iowa who holds the world record in the 100 yards with 10.4, although it is not certain that Iowa will be entered.
