The 25th anniversary celebration was the principal reason for the official holiday this year but the success of yesterday's exercises warrants making it an annual holiday.

BASEBALL TEAM CONCLUDES UNSUCCESSFUL SEASON WITH TEN WINS, THIRTEEN LOSSES

Victory List Includes Such Schools as Iowa, Notre Dame, and University of Chicago; Team Shows Flashes of Power But Cooperation is Lacking.

Michigan State's baseball team closed one of its most disastrous seasons in years last week, when the Kobsmen wound up with a record of ten wins out of twenty-three games played. Three of the ten games won were chalked up on the southern trip.

Only seven games were won during the regular season. Two of these were against the University of Iowa and one each against St. Viator, Central State Teachers college, Hillsdale college, the University of Notre Dame and the University of Chicago.

The team lost games to Luther college, University of Michigan, Notre Dame, Ohio university, Central State Teachers, and two to Michigan State Normal and Western State Normal. A game with North-western university was called off on account of rain and another game with the University of Michigan ended in a 3 to 2 tie after sixteen innings of play at Ann Arbor.

State Gets Good Start

The Spartans after what seemed to be a brilliant getaway seemed to lose a great share of their punch at the plate and this coupled with innumerable errors by the infield, were responsible for the defeats that were handed to them almost as a matter of course.

Critics at Various Times

Critics at various times during the season censured the team for displaying a lack of fight. That this was not entirely true is shown by the fact that in the first game with the University of Michigan as well as in the University of Chicago encounter only determination and spirit allowed the Spartans to hold the Wolverines in the first case, and to win a victory in the second.

Kobs Lacks Pitchers

Lack of efficient pitchers can be pointed out as one of the reasons for the poor showing made by the team. Only Charles Griffin was able to show consistent good form. Berwyn Pemberton, Pete Brose and Gerald McCoshin, other hurlers on the staff were effective only at times. Because these men did not come up to the standard expected of them by the fans, the team was handicapped.

Outfield Performs Well

Only in the outfield did the State team come up to the standard set by former ones. Messrs. Kriebel, Gaffner and Pascoe made up one of the best ball-hacking groups that Kobs has turned out. Though the group was not especially strong at bat, Pascoe and Gaffner were at capable hitters at any on the team.

Four Men Graduate

Four men from the team this year will be lost to Coach Kobs when he goes to issue calls for players next season. Charles Griffin, ace of the mound staff, Captain John Madonia, shortstop Pete Brose, right-handed pitcher and Harold Cuthbertson, second baseman, played their last season in collegiate competition this year.

Griffin and Madonia Will Not Stop

Griffin and Madonia will not stop playing ball, however. Both of these men attracted the eyes of professional team scouts and will play professional ball for the remainder of the year. Captain Madonia will play with either Des Moines or Denver of the Western league, while Griffin will be pitching for the Milwaukee Brewers of the American association.

Opposition that State met this year has been above the average and perhaps the Spartans' poor record can be attributed to the fact that in the meeting up of a good team with a better team the good team usually loses.
