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SLIGHT DROP IN FALL QUARTER REGISTRATION

Enrollment Reaches 3,067 According to Latest Figures
Few Still Entering.

OFFICIALS ARE PLEASED
Expected 10 Per Cent Decrease
Lowers to Three Per Cent
Enrollment Proceeds.

The fear that the registration for fall term this year would fall far below the same enrollment of last year has been entirely destroyed as the total registration to date has mounted to nearly 3,100 with a few stragglers still coming to register in various classes.

For the year 1934, the open enrollment 1934 new students, which set an all-time record, was 3,067.

Although the first-day registration of this year fell below the same enrollment of last year, the students coming in late in the year have made up the difference.

A report from the registrar office in Wednesday showed that the total enrollment for the fall term 1934, which covers all departments, is 3,067.

Summer Term Sees Changes in Library

The summer just past has been a busy one for the Michigan State college library. A number of new projects have been completed in various rooms of the library building.

The State Board of Agriculture, authorized the addition of over a hundred dollars worth of wall shelves for the library. The book budget is large enough so that three or four experiments in recreational reading can be undertaken, and a portion of the new wall shelving has been placed in the assisted reading room.

The work of each department of the library has been carefully outlined in accordance with the most recent practice in college library administration. Daily, weekly, monthly and annual functions of each of the department heads have been determined and set down on paper.

To provide for the expansion of the collection, it has been necessary to shift all the books in the library from 50,000 bound volumes over 50,000 full catalogued books, on six stack tiers. The stacks have been clearly re-labeled, and a check of missing books taken in the following fields: general works, philosophy, religion, philosophy, fine arts and useful arts. Only 300 books were found missing in these fields.

The Michigan State college library is a full depository for the documents of the state.

Squad to Be Increased; Young

With four letter winners returning and bolstered further by the appearance of Thomas, Chief, the first American to finish in the 10,000 meter event in the Olympic cross-country prospects are particularly bright.

They are Marshall Goodwin, semi-finalist in the Lansing city tourney, and Dave Nordwall, who was a member of the freshman team two years ago.

In addition there are several sophomores, including Gordon, Schultz, and O'Dell, who will make a serious bid for a position.

Prof. C. D. Hall, coach of the team, says: "The outlook for the 1933 tennis squad is the best in several years' time due to the fact that we have the members of last year's team back, besides some promising newcomers."

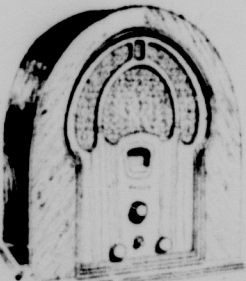
Speculations are going on as to whether the Spartans will win or lose. The Michigan team is expected to be a strong one.

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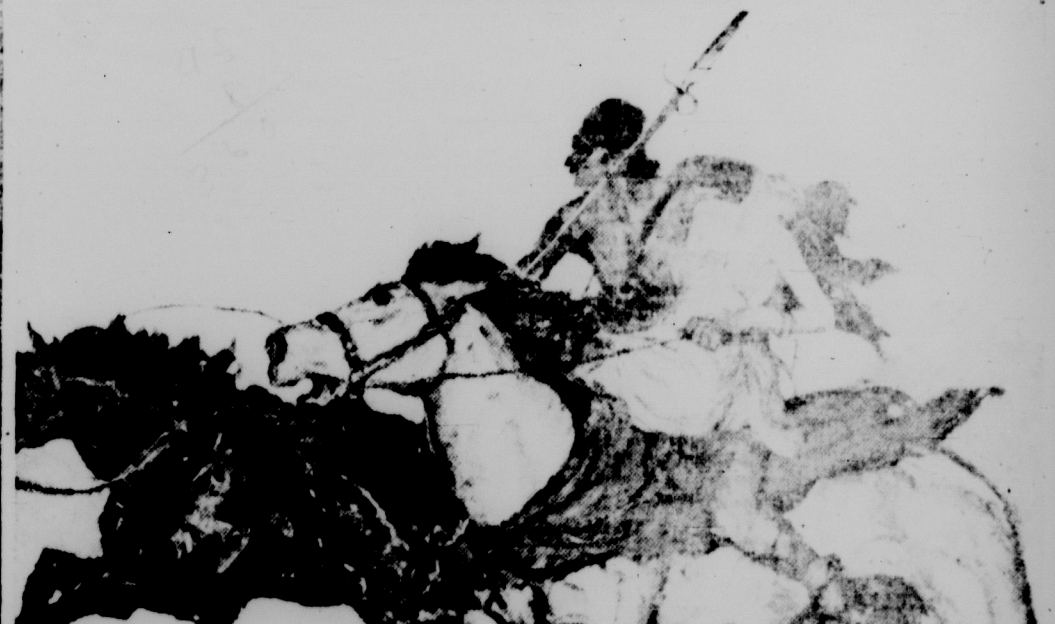
