Singing floats will then draw lots to see which receive the remaining five. Jay Jepson and June Francis will supervise the allotment of floats to the men's and women's organizations, respectively, as soon as the winning theme is selected by the three judges: Prof. L. F. Waldo, Prof. Fred Patton, and Prof. A. G. Scheele. These three men selected to choose the best theme will also judge the floats themselves at the carnival.

Entertainment for the spectators during intermission will be furnished this year by a series of short skits and acts performed by talented students on the campus. The committee has several novel ideas along this line, but they will not be divulged until arrangements are made more definitely.

Several of the committees have undertaken projects in addition to their regular allotted duties. Bill Botta is working with Prof. C. H. Nuckle of the speech department in the origination and development of new and improved lighting effects for the illumination of the floats. Publicity under the direction of Bob Stoll has been extended to include Detroit and Grand Rapids, since past experience has shown that the carnival each year draws to the carnival an increasing number of people from these cities.

The annual senior Water Carnival has been an outstanding feature of graduation activities at State for many years, and is said to be the

only thing of its kind staged on any campus in the United States. Boaters to accommodate nearly 1,600 spectators are erected on the north side of the Red Cedar river adjacent to the Farm Lane bridge, with a stage built on the opposite side of the stream. The various floats, totaling 25, are towed at intervals downstream by means of a cable system, the entire procession requiring approximately two hours to pass the reviewing stand. Color is added to the affair by staging it after dark with colored spotlights illuminating the floats.

The float parade is preceded by various canoe races and a canoe-baiting event with both men and women participating, and trophies are awarded the winners. Intermission occurs after half of the floats have passed at which time entertainment is provided for the spectators. At the conclusion of the second day of the carnival the decisions of the judges are announced and prizes are awarded to the societies with the best floats.

# Baseball Nine Opens Season In Hillsdale Game on Saturday

State Fans to See Best Team in Recent Years in Opening Game; Berg to Start for Spartans; Dale's Starter Yet Uncertain.

Beating the opening of the major league season by three days, the Spartan baseball nine will blast the lid off the 1935 season tomorrow afternoon with the Hillsdale squad as opposition. When President Shaw throws out the first ball, State fans will have their first glance at what should be the strongest diamond team to wear the Green and White in recent years.

Johnny Berg will be on the mound for John Kobs' men in their first game on the regular schedule. He will be caught by Steve Sebo unless the sophomore backstop suffers a relapse in his throwing arm overnight.

Little is known of the strength of the Hillsdale outfit. They are untested in competition so far this season, but the same condition existed last year when they threw a scare into the Spartans by passing them in a 3-2 victory. Hillsdale is one of the best of the M. I. A. schools on the diamond and annually puts a strong lineup on the field.

Pest Welch will be the first Spartan to step up to the plate for his turn at bat. He is one of the 300 hitters on the squad. Following him in succession will be Theron Fager and Arnold Parker, the latter the strongest hitter of the outfit with a .462 average. Milt Lehnardt, another sophomore, is slated for the cleanup role that he held in all the games in the south and will bat in this inning if any of the first trio get on the bases.

The lower end of the lineup represents the real power in State's attack and will come up in the second and third frames. Sebo bats fifth, followed by Captain Rouse and Eddie Fiedler, 300 hitters all. Fiedler rounds out the batting order with Johnny Berg. Both are good hitters.

The first Hillsdale batter, and therefore the first of the day, will be Charland, the left fielder and a stranger to the Spartans. Sebo, the colored boy who played against State in basketball, is next. He played here on the Hillsdale team two years ago but was missing last season. He will be followed by Wormstaff, another newcomer, and Williams, the two teaming together around the keystone sack on defense.

Randall, the fifth Hillsdale batter, played left last year and got one hit. He is center field in this year's team. He is followed by Don Smith, the third baseman and Gordon, the right fielder who went hitless in last season's encounter.

The Hillsdale battery will have Forquibson as the catcher and either Hogan or Emerich on the slab. The catcher is a veteran in his position and Hogan was placed on the mound last from his former right field spot.

The new stands are already up on College field as is the backstop, on which workmen have been working for the last two weeks. The diamond is in good shape and baring a sudden rainstorm will be fast for the opener.

Last fall he received honorable mention several All-Americans, and we believe that if his fine all-around play this year is as good as last fall's he should make the official All-American. State supporters will be interested to know that one of the teams entered by the U. of M. will be a four mile relay, composed of Walter Stone, Nerec Aliv, Clayton Brelford and Harvey Smith. The Detroit Free Press says: "Michigan's time of 18:02.6 in winning at Indianapolis is considered fast enough to warrant the team from Ann Arbor being considered a strong championship possibility in the Penn. carnival."

However, when we see just what average the above time shows for each man we are forced to disagree with the aforementioned paper. 18:02.6 shows each man to have an average of approximately 4.51 for the mile. There are five men here at State who can better that mark by a good margin.

In an interview with the members of the Spartan quartet, their opinions were requested and are reproduced below. The five men on the team, four regulars and one alternate, seem to have the same reaction as we to the entry of Michigan's four-mile relay team in the Penn. Relays.

Capt. Wesley Hurd says: "I think we have the better team. Michigan is strong and well-balanced, but there are three men on our team who will be running their last race against the U. of M. and this should count a lot in the final result of the race. North Carolina, Manhattan and Michigan will be the teams to beat."

Quoting Thomas Otter: "Michigan has a good four-mile team but they are far from being the best in the country, as newspaper articles would have us believe. We are glad to have an opportunity to run against them, and it should be remembered that four-mile relay teams are not built on paper."

Says J. Nelson Gardner: "Great! They have such a good team on paper that Michigan has us figured as beat by about 6 seconds. We would like to see just how good they are in actual competition."

Charles Dennis: "Glad they are running, although they will be a hard team to beat. I can't see Michigan as a championship team because none of their milers are exceptional and I doubt if they have four milers to make a well-balanced team."

John Hammer: "If State is going good we will beat Michigan. Man to man I think we have the better team."
