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THOMAS OTLEY WINS ATHLETIC COUNCIL AWARD

Cross Country Captain Named as Senior Who Has Best Combined Athletics With Scholarship

PRIZE IS GOLD MEDAL Attainments Cited Include Senior Class Presidency, High Average and Working Way Through School

Thomas C. Otley, of Ardenmore, Pa., is the winner of the Michigan State college athletic council award for this year. It was announced Wednesday. The award consists of a gold medal and is given each year to the member of the senior class who has best combined athletic achievements with scholarship throughout his college career.

Otley is the president of the senior class. Through a high scholastic average earned by him in the business administration curriculum he was made a member of Sigma Epsilon fraternity and honor society. Other attainments include membership in Fraternity, Blue Key, Southard and Black and the student council. He is also a member of the Y.M.C.A. fraternity, Y.M.C.A. club and Y.M.C.A. club.

As an athlete Otley has gained national attention and was a member of the United States Olympic team which competed at Los Angeles in 1932. He was the first man from this country to finish in the 10,000 meter event at that meet. He has also run for Uncle Sam as international events with Great Britain. He won the national intercollegiate cross-country championship for two consecutive years, each time leading the state team to victory. Otley also has run all distances from the half mile to the two mile on track, long and was a member of the relay team that broke the national record this spring.

In addition to his scholastic and athletic honors, Tom has found time to work practically his entire way through college. He served as manager of the White ball board during the 1934 year. The announcement made by the athletic council closed by saying: "Thomas Otley combines the qualities of a leader, an athlete, a fighter, a business man, promoter, organizer, and gentleman of the highest degree."

And now to the man who has won the highest individual athletic and scholastic honor of the graduating seniors, we tender congratulations. Tom C. Otley of Ardenmore, Pa. is the gentleman and he really is deserving of a big hand. Tom in addition to all this has been national cross country champion for the past two years, winning the event in '32 and '34 at Van Cortlandt park, New York.
