M. S. C. Commended

Michigan State college deserves a back pat for opening wide its portals to Norman

Mr. Thomas, who visited Lansing and East Lansing Monday, is the nation's foremost socialist. A decade ago his arrival in town might have signaled fearful mothers to call their youngsters off the streets, lest they fall into bolshevik clutches. When the name "socialist" was mentioned, many an imagination etched a mental picture of a black-bearded Siberian, with a thick accent on his tongue, a bomb on each hip, and a medal imprinted with Lenin's profile pinned on his chest.

But that exaggerated portrait has long since been packed away in the attic of by gone bugaboos. Most of us now know that socialist leaders in America do not have private telephone wires connecting them with Moscow, and we have also begun to realize that some socialistic theories are far less fantastic than many of the eco nomic brain-children incubated in Mr. Roosevelt's White House nursery.

If any socialist had spawned that NRA (everybody get a blue eagle) nightmare, he would promptly have been tossed into jail as a Stalin protege plotting to overthrow American industry. But good old Hugh Johnson and his fellow crack-downers got away with it-for awhile.

Undoubtedly many of the Spartan students who heard Mr. Thomas' address vigorously disagreed with his doctrines That, of course, was their privilege, and the speaker would be the last to deny them it.

Yet conflict in opinions did not deter his listeners from giving the socialist standard bearer the courteous attention his prominence deserved. That is healthful. wholesome tolerance, and if the young men and women in American college are cultivating it, a greater democracy is in the

malignant weeds of communism and fasc ism blossom in domestic soil. But the seeds implanted therein by professional agitators and foreign ballyhoo artists will never be uprooted by a crusade of river-dunking and insult-tossing. Dangerous "isms" cannot be destroyed merely by giving the bum's rush. to every crack-pot messiah who climbs aboard a campus coap-box. Persecution, rather than extermination of the budding fuehrer, only fashions a martyr's halo to glorify his insidious attack

Then, too, there lurks the alarming pit fall of mistaking the well-meaning liberal for a Hitler or Stalin propoganda sales man. When an overzealous young defender of democracy takes a wild, blind swing at radicalism, the odds are strong that his punch will jolt innocent victims

The militant patriot who stamps communists, socialists, progressives and trade unionists with the solitary label, "red," is an economic bull-in-the-china-shop, His rampages of "rugged Americanism" are all too apt to beomerang against the very principles of government he battles to protect Inversely, he is as mentally adolescent as the featherbrain who espouses every parlor pink "cause" that comes his way. Both are

Wise, indeed, is the youth who pa heed to what might be termed the ninth beatifude: "Blessed is he with an open. tolerant mind." The destinty of democracy will rest securely on his shoulders


