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Negro Singer Captivates Audience

Marian Anderson
Sings Before 1800
In Peoples Church

Marian Anderson, celebrated negro contralto, sang to an enthusiastic audience of 1800 students and faculty members when she presented her concert Tuesday night in Peoples church. Miss Anderson's program was exceptionally well-chosen to emphasize the great control and the range, power and beauty of her voice. The program was well-balanced also, since it included the works of composers of various periods. She sang the less well-known numbers of famous composers.

In "Oberon" by Handel, which opened the concert, Miss Anderson surprised the audience with the controlled first long crescendo note. The rest of the piece fulfilled the calm mood in which it opened.

"Sei Fiorindo E Fedele" by Scialotti was a light-hearted love song, contrasting greatly with the first number. The artist was as pleasing in this piece. She concluded the first group with Bizet's familiar "Agnus Dei," which was beautiful in its smoothness, contrast, and understanding interpretation.

The second part was composed entirely of Schubert's compositions. "Der Tod und das Maedchen" See ANDERSON Page 3

Mary Ida Austin and John Marshall were the winners in the poetry reading contest held Tuesday, April 19. They will represent Michigan State in the state poetry reading contest to be held at Hope college, May 13.

Second place winners were Shirley Cook and Laurence Hamilton. In the contest, each entrant gave two selections, one about five minutes in length, and a shorter one of about one minute.

Mary Austin, winner in the women's contest, gave the selections "Paterne" by Amy Lowell and "When in Durance with Fortune and Men's Eyes" by Shakespeare. The winner of the men's contest, John Marshall, gave "Lafayette, the Man of the People" by Edwin Markham, and "Deep Wet Moss" by Lew Sareff.

Judges in the contest were Laura Berginger, instructor in English; Gordon Fischer, speech instructor; and E. E. Hygen, instructor in economics, and the contest was directed by C. H. Nickle, of the speech department.

Prizes of ten and five dollars were given to first and second place winners in both men's and women's contests. The State contest will be conducted similarly, except that instead of selecting one winner, the four best will be chosen and awarded the same prizes.

Going into the ninth, the score was tied at one-alk, and at the rate Libbers had been pitching things looked good for State. Then things went haywire.

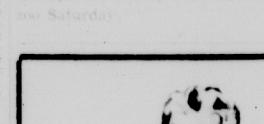
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East Lansing Trackmen Race Okemos Today

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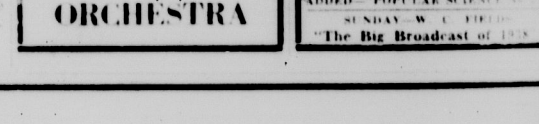
