

4 Facultyman Speaks Of Shaw's 10 Years

From the point of view of the faculty the ten-year tenure of President Shaw has meant the most outstanding development of the College in its history. A mere re-cital of significant developments in this effort would require more space than is allotted for this, editorial but one cannot refer to the past teh years without calling attention to many outstanding develop-

ments. Foremost among these I think is the rec-ognition that the College has received by being placed on the accredited list of the Association of American Universities. This placed the College in the class of the best institutions of the nation. Closely follow-ing this recognition came admission to the American Association of University Women, another signal distinction. At the present time a committee is busying itself with the preparation of information about with the preparation of information about the College to submit to the national offic ers of Phi Beta Kappa looking towerd a request for a charter from this organiza-

There have been many excellent addi-tions to the faculty which have greatly strengthened the quality of the courses that are offered, and have added to the prestige of the faculty as viewed by other educational institutions. Our relations with other colleges have been further strength-ened by our membership in a Cooperative ened by our membership in a Cooperative Bureau of Educational Research which has attracted national attention and which has been partly financed by the General Edu-cation Board.

The beautiful new dormitories for women and one just being completed for men make possible proper housing and so-cial training for both men and women. The establishment of the office of Dean of Men and the appointment of Dean Fred T. Mit-chell as the first occupant of this office have meaant much in the proper handling of men students' problems both among the fraternities and the independent group. Campus improvements have been exten-

sive. The paving of the campus roads, landscaping of grounds around many buildings and the planting of permanent trees, as well as the addition of the new dormi-tories, the Band Shell, the new Anatomy building, the removal of the barns to the south of the river, the new wing on the Union Building and the completion of the Union Building have added greatly to the

beauty of the campus. The High School visitation program has served to acquaint the school officials of the state with the services that Michigan State College is able to render to the youth of the state and has resulted in a very fine

of the state and has resulted in a very file spirit of cooperation between high school officials and College officials. Summer school has been developed and extended under the leadership of Professor Crowe to the point where it is one of the leading summer schools of the Midwest. The Library has been permitted to extend a school because its personnel its purchases and to increase its personnel so that the use of the Library by students

so that the use of the Library by students is greatly augmented. New departments, particularly in the-field of the cultural subjects such as the Languages, Art, Speech and Dramatics have meant much in the proper handling making a name for the College in their separate fields.

A plan of retirement for the faculty has A plan of refirement for the factory has been worked out and is put into operation this year for the first time. Under its pro-visions those who have given long periods of service to the College may refire with a life income. The matter of leaves of absence for travel and advance study has been clarified with the result that many staff members avail themselves of the op-portunity for self-improvement in this

All of these things have added to the morale both of the student body and of the faculty with the result that the College can pride itself upon the fact that there is less misundersanding and dissatisfaction in its student body and dissatisfac-tion in its student body and its faculty than will be found on most campuses of the

Model Farm, But Roads Cut Through

Playing at farming. What could be a better hobby for the president of an agricultural college?

For that is just what President Robert S. Shaw does in his spare time, specializing in those fa? mous red apples which he gives out with such a lavish hand. The farm, located at the intersection of M-78 and Harrison road, is made up of an orchard, a vineyard, and acres of wood-land, which furnish many trees to the Michigan State college

President Shaw originally had 160 acres of farm land. His idea was to form a "model farm." He was going to keep books, carry on agriculture scientifically, and would, at the end of 20 years, make public the records which he was going

to gathe For seven years the plan

worked. Then he awoke one morning to learn that his farm was to be cut in two by the formation of a new highway, M-78.

new highway. Then the East Lansing school district was enlarged, includ ing his land, which brought a threefold increase in taxes. Increasing responsibilities a the college took President Shaw farther and farther from hi "model farm," until today, his orchard and his nursery are al

Last fall and winter President Shaw gave 200 bushels of apples to students and friends. The apples are handed to visitors in his office, or are sent in great quantities, to dormitories and severities.



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
