

Council Lowers East Lansing Tax Rate

20-Cent Cut Based on New Budget Figure

Insurance for Firemen, New Water Softener Get Approval.

East Lansing will have a tax rate cut of 20 cents, it was announced after the council meeting last Monday night.

Total assessed community tax was set at \$8,113,532.00. The present assessed valuation. The amount to be raised this year was set at \$79,408.16 and the new rate was fixed at \$9.20, a reduction of 20 cents from last year.

The problem of insuring Lansing firemen against hazards in combating local fires, and the financing of an additional water softening plant were also discussed.

Herman Henkel, Lansing insurance agent, was asked to obtain insurance rates from Lloyd's of London for protection for Lansing firemen against injury or loss from damage, theft, or collision of trucks. Lloyd's is the only firm which will underwrite such risks. The action was taken in compliance with a Lansing statute which requires such protection for city firemen. Definite figures on the insurance rates will be available within a few days.

Dean Reveals Progress Made

Dean L. C. Emmons of the Liberal arts division, announces that progress is being made toward a revised practice teaching schedule. All training facilities previously used except the East Lansing schools will be on a larger scale.

The college expects to establish the training for graduating teachers in the Mason school and in the Everett school south of Lansing. Facilities now available in Williamston and Okemos will be extended, as will be those of the Lansing schools.

Summer Weather Improves City Library Circulation

Whether it's cold or whether it's hot, people read books whether or not.

This new twist to an old axiom is proven right here in East Lansing where a good majority of the people spend their leisure time, both winter and summer, in reading.

Contrary to the popular conception that fewer books are checked out and read during the summer months, the circulation at the East Lansing public library equals, and has even been known to surpass, that of the winter months.

Last year in the month of August the high point in the cir-

ulation count was made and June and July compare favorably with the other nine months.

While a great deal of research and reference work is done during the fall and winter, fiction material is in greatest demand. This is probably accounted for by the fact that people's tastes incline toward relaxation and enjoyment rather than serious study and concentration during the hot weather. Those unable to get away on trips find escape from their year-round task in adventure and travel books.


Too Good a Team
