For the first time this year dancers may get refreshments at the Armory. A root beer bar and tables have been installed on one side of the floor.

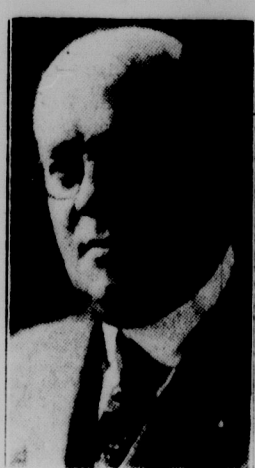
Newmanites Seek New Members

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College Health Service Head Dies In Sleep: Was Recovering From Serious Illness

Dr. Richard M. Olin, director of the college health service, died suddenly at his home at 138 Linden street, East Lansing, about 11:30 o'clock Tuesday night. He will be buried at 1 o'clock Friday afternoon in Evergreen cemetery. Death was due to coronary thrombosis.

Doctor Olin was taken seriously ill on September 22, and has been confined to his home since that time. However, his condition was reported much improved last week, and it was thought that he would recover.

Secretary John Hannah visited Doctor Olin Tuesday evening, and discussed plans for the new hospital with him. His condition was improved to such an extent that he talked of being moved to the college hospital, where he could better supervise the activities of the health center. As Hannah left, Doctor Olin said that he was planning to listen to the world series broadcast Wednesday afternoon. He passed away quietly in his sleep later in the night.

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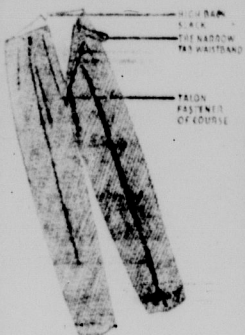
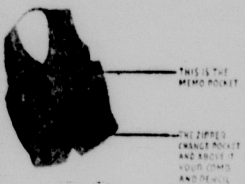
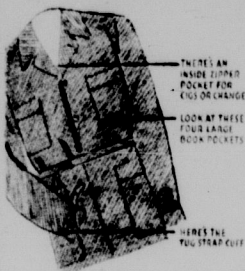
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Invite Public To MCSA Meeting

Instead of the usual rest prescribed for first team members on the Monday following a game, Coach Charley Bachman had his squad put on "hats" and go through a lengthy scrimmage. The procedure was repeated yesterday.

Pictures of the Michigan game also were shown to the squad, and mistakes made were pointed out. The fact that the Spartans were badly outcharged was clearly demonstrated. Bachman is stressing the fact that the Spartans need a little more drive in their forward wall.

Several changes have been made in the line. Lyle Ruckelshaus has been shifted over to right guard from his regular position on the left side of the line, while Paul Griffith, Sturgis sophomore who played a large part in game at Ann Arbor was moved into the left guard spot. Another guard, Myron Mast, also has been getting plenty of attention from the coaches.

These changes seem to indicate that Bachman is not too well satisfied with the center of the State line, which, at first, was thought to be a strong unit.

The rise at tackle of Stanley McRae, Pittston junior, also is noteworthy. McRae lacks experience but has the makings of the best tackle on the squad once he gains confidence. He is fast for his 225 pounds and boasts great strength. Although he still lacks perfect punting form, he kicks a football tremendous distance.
