biological laboratories. Because the treatment has been successful in 85 per cent of the cases, demand for the serum has been increasing, although there has been no shortage. The department is now filling from 20 to 100 orders a week which have come from physicians. The national institute of health last month licensed the laboratory to manufacture the serum.

Doctor Huddleson started doing research work when he came to Michigan State college in 1916 as a research assistant. In 1926 he was appointed research professor of bacteriology. During his years at Michigan State college he has published 65 articles and one book.

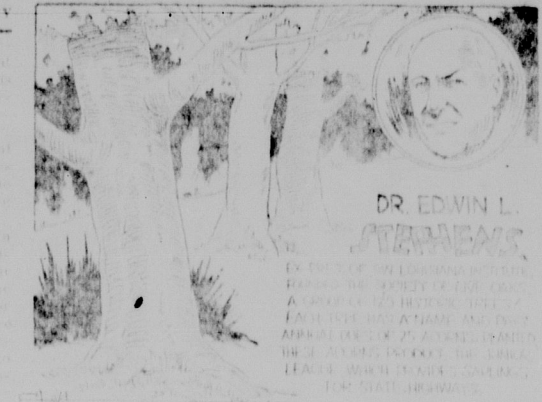

Sophomores Star As Team Comes Back Strong

Back on the victory trail in rather dubious fashion by virtue of an 18-0 victory scored over a hard-fighting Illinois Wesleyan eleven, the Spartan footballers rested on their oars today, faced with the threat of an encounter with a bruising West Virginia team next Saturday at Morgantown.

If the Spartans hope to trip the Mountaineers they must shake the lethargy which has gripped them since the Michigan game. West Virginia's football star has risen rapidly in the past few years and they are now a team to be reckoned with. State must be at their best to match a victor.

In the Wesleyan game last Saturday, State looked anything but the team that this year was predicted as one of the best in the nation. Their blocking and tackling was off and they lacked sustained drive. Wesleyan, on the other hand, offered stubborn resistance and but for the last half degree, which netted them three touchdowns, the Spartans had their hands full.

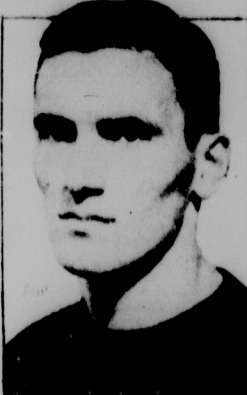
