

According to City Clerk Harry W. Loh, the allotment for the improvement of the sewage disposal system has been received.

He was notified by telegram from the central office of the PWA that \$43,077 had been granted, and that a check was being rushed to East Lansing. The officials also noted that all final plans and specifications for the plant be forwarded to the PWA office as soon as they are completed.

The total cost of the plant is expected to reach \$300,000. With the government grant of \$43,077, there is left \$256,923 of which the city will pay 60% and the college will pay the remainder.

## Trojans to Play Twin Valley Champs Next Friday

Fortified with a 14-0 victory over a strong invading team from Alma last Friday afternoon, Coach Cuddy Shaver's Trojans settled down to a week of hard preparation for the coming tilt with Albion.

Albion at present is leading Twin Valley conference which is one of the toughest high school football leagues in Michigan. They boast a big fast, offensively minded team that never says "die." Could the Trojans turn the trick and defeat Albion it would be a big feather in their hats and stamp them as one of the best teams to come out of East Lansing.

The Trojans looked impressive in the first two minutes of their game Friday but they faded into listlessness and after losing two rapid-fire touchdowns they were held scoreless the remainder of the game.

**LACK PEP**  
If Shaver could repair the team and fire that the boys displayed on this occasion, the season would probably be ended but from the looks of things in practice this week, however, it is the Trojans who will play with pep and vigor.

## Injury Costs Team Szasz For Year

**Breaks Collarbone In Practice Drill; Nelson Kept Home**

Michigan State's football team, 38 strong, will leave this afternoon at 3:30 o'clock for Columbia, Mo., where they will meet the strong University of Missouri team Saturday.

The Spartans will go into the game badly crippled. An epidemic of injuries struck the squad this week, and as a result many valuable players will be out of action Saturday.

Steve Szasz, Johnny Budnicki, Paul Derrickson and Ole Nelson will not be with the squad when it enters. All are still suffering from injuries received against Santa Clara.

**INJURY DRILL**  
Szasz, the speedy little halfback who opened the season at right half, fractured a collarbone in practice Tuesday night and has joined Gene Cook on the sidelines for the rest of the season.

Szasz's loss will further handicap the right half situation, for with both Budnicki and Szasz out, the responsibility falls on the chunky shoulders of Edie France.

Nelson has a bad ankle, and has been out of practice sessions all week. His absence will rob State of the best punter on the squad.

Coach Charles Bachman has stressed pass defense this week, out of respect for Paul Christopherson, Missouri's 215 pound sophomore halfback. Christopherson is a star player, observers giving him one of the best in the country.

**WORK ON ATTACK**  
The Spartans also have worked up on their own passing attack, which proved a very attractive ground game in the game last week with the Tigers. If their ground game is stopped Saturday, State will take to the air.

Protection for punters was another phase of the game in which the squad was drilled. Bachman has been directing Missouri to block back the way Santa Clara did.

Three punters, the late O. C. Johnson, Mike, Mackay, Keith, Moore, and Bob, are expected to be in action.

**Frat Pin Leagues To Start Tuesday**

## Yearlings Win Harrier Run With Preps

Michigan State's freshman cross country team weathered the combined efforts of the Lansing high school harriers to win by the narrow margin, 24-31, Tuesday afternoon at Hancock Park, Lansing.

Eastern, Central and St. Mary's high schools were represented in the meet, with Eastern showing the greatest strength among the prepsters, placing runners in third and fourth places.

The best that St. Mary's could do was the fifth slot, while Central had to be satisfied with twelfth position as their high mark against the elite field.

Gene Vaughn, star Spartan freshman, led the pack in 9:19.3 for the 1.9 mile course. Darsen Bruce trailed up another of his runners-up triumphs, with a time of 9:23.

Donald Merritt and Richard Foster, Eastern ace, were next to finish. Domenico Lacato of the parochial finished only a few straggles back in fifth position.

Then came the remainder of the freshman squad, of Robert Hennigan, Cleon Smith, Melville Hayes, David Cowden, Louis Gray, and John Hamilton in their respective order.

**Frosh Eleven To Oppose Western**

While the varsity football team headed for Columbia, Mo., and the wide open spaces, Michigan State football fans will be able to observe another Spartan gridiron team in action.

Coach John Kube and his freshman football squad will be going into the second lap of its 1938 schedule when they tackle a powerful and dangerous Western State Teachers' freshman squad in Mackinac field Friday afternoon at 4 p. m.

The varsity, "the big boys" will be seeking revenge for a 7-0 defeat suffered at the hands of the University of Detroit freshmen last week.

As for Coach Kube and his men, they are determined to stifle up their second straight win of the season and to avenge the 20-0 shellacking suffered by the 1937 yearling squad at the hands of the Hilltoppers.

Having named out the boys which appeared in the Normal victory of last week, the Spartan yearlings are considered to have a chance of upsetting their highly touted opponents.

The same lineup which started the Normal game of last Friday, with the exception of fullback, will probably see action tomorrow. The probable starting lineup follows: Speelman and Kuchinski, ends; Lee and Smith, tackles; Finley and Rupp, guards; Arena, center; Tucker, quarterback; Ostrom and Deane, halfbacks; and Kaman at fullback.

The same lineup which was successful against Iowa State and consisting of Capt. Manuel A. Ortega at back position, Don Robinson at No. 1, and Emil Larsen at the No. 2 spot, will start against the Broncos.

The "B" team lineup will be Bob Chazy, back, Curtis Weaver, No. 1, and John Mathewson, No. 2. Edward Vincent and Tom Kent will probably see action.

The Broncos won the mid-summer tournament held by the Michigan Polo association and should prove a difficult team to beat. The admission is 15 cents to students and 25 cents to all others.

**B. Acres Win Block Title**

The Pushovers accomplished last evening what no other team has been able to do thus far, by holding the powerful Briggs Acres team to a scoreless draw. The tie score, however, entitles Briggs Acres to the block 4 championship.

## Found: Way to Conquer Missouri Grid Squad

Found! A way to defeat Missouri! All our Spartans will have to do down there in the Ozarks next Saturday is to score 14 points.

That's right, 14 points—no more, no less. Why? Well, those Tigers have a 12-point complex. They have scored that number of tallies in four of their five games this year. In the opener against Colorado they splurged and chalked up 14 but after that one flash, slumped down into their 12-point groove.

**WIN THREE TIMES**  
These two "regular" touch-downs have been enough to account for three victories. They dropped Colorado 14-7, Washington university 14-0, and Nebraska 13-0. Kansas State handed them a 21-13 setback, while Iowa State pulled the trick 16-13.

The victory over Nebraska last week was the thriller of the day. Nebraska jumped to a 3-0 lead early in the second quarter, only to see it vanish a few minutes later when Paul Christopherson heaved a touchdown pass.

The Cornhuskers took over control by returning the second half kickoff for a touchdown. Then the Tigers really struck with a vengeance. Christopherson took over mound duty, filled the air with passes, and when the final one landed, they had another touchdown and a 12-10 lead, which they held.

Coach Charles Bachman will be wise if he equips his lads with marauders, since the game promises to develop into an aerial battle. Their sophomore star, Christopherson, is termed the best passer in the country, and the record books uphold the statement.

**BEST IN NATION**  
There it is, learned that Christopherson has the highest average of completed passes in the nation. Against Nebraska he completed seven out of 15 tosses for 136 yards.

Christopherson also is ranked best running back on the team. Weighing an even 200 pounds he is a hard man for any tackle to stop. The rest of the starting back, Faurel, Starnes, and Bobb are all fast, powerful runners, and are a constant menace.

The line averages 338 feet in length and 195 pounds in weight. The probable starting lineup: Boice, left end; Gudrum, left tackle; Waldron, left guard; Kibben, center; Pickett, right guard; Rau, right tackle; Musgrave, right end; Faurel, quarterback; Christopherson, left half; Starnes, right half; and Bobb, fullback.
