Seals Lessen Death Toll

Officers of the Michigan Tuberculosis Association agreed at the association's recent thirty-first annual meeting at Muskegon that the annual sale of tuberculosis Christmas seals has been a primary factor in helping to stem the tuberculosis death toll in Michigan.

The sale of the seals, which have been shown to reduce in annual tuberculosis deaths during the past fifty years, is an achievement which Michigan people themselves have helped to bring about through their generous purchases of the Christmas seals, the officers declared.

Newly elected president of the association, Dr. John Alexander James, chief surgeon of Ann Arbor, pointed out that tuberculosis Christmas seals financed tuberculosis fight tuberculosis in Michigan chiefly through health education and case-finding.

Prof Baten Writes Book Making Statistics Clear

Prof. W. D. Baten, mathematics professor of Michigan State college, published last September with John Wiley and Sons a book dealing with "Elementary Mathematical Statistics."

This book has been judged as excellent, having been very well received in the brief time since its appearance on the market.

Baten's text, containing 330 pages, was written primarily for students interested in statistics who have not studied differential and integral calculus.

In attempts to develop formulas and fundamental relations by the use of very simple algebra, trigonometry, and analytical geometry. Each bit of theory is illustrated by an example.

The book contains many problems for students to solve, because the author believes that one learns by doing. The problems are arranged in a group, by solving problems designed to bring out the meaning of theory. Where theory requires advanced mathematical examples are given.

Comparisons are provided for the purpose of distinguishing differences between the concepts of linear correlation, non-linear correlation, and correlation based on the correlation ratio.

Tables have not been spaced in the presentation of points, multiple and tabular correlation.
