Michigan State's varsity basketball team opened its 1938 schedule with a 33 to 26 victory over Kalamazoo college before an estimated crowd of 3,000 spectators last night in Demonstration hall.

## Corsages May be Banned

That corsages may be banned from the campus this coming winter term became more than a possibility last night when the topic was brought up for discussions at two campus meetings. First group to raise the question of whether or not corsages should be outlawed was the Student Council. The second was the student faculty social committee, consisting of five deans and two students, which went on record as desiring to initiate action that would satisfy the majority of State students. No action was taken by either group because of the great importance of the subject. The Student-Faculty social committee did not wish to act until assured by the Student Council that students as a group favored abandonment of personal floral decorations at the winter formal parties. Also holding off temporarily, members of the Student Council decided not to act until every member of the council had opportunity to consult with members of the group he represents and report back his findings to the council. Votes will be taken at early meetings of the Student Council and social committee. Both groups await only an indication of general student opinions.

The case against the corsage is a strong one. It is one of the contributing factors that keeps hundreds of students from enjoying the large winter term party. They have described his running, his kicking, his passing, his ability to come through in a clutch, his value to his team, and a hundred and one other things.

None, however, prior to last Sunday brought to the front an incident which took place 18 years ago between Johnny and his father.

The chronicler of the event was Paul Jablonski of the Bay City Times.

Jablonski's story becomes all the more touching when one realizes the close friendship which existed between Johnny and his dad, himself a former State football player, but now dead.

### Then Only Three

In his description Jablonski takes his readers back to a Sunday afternoon in 1920. The late George Pingel, with young Johnny, then only three, proudly drove along M. Clemens' main street.

There was a third person in the car, a man in his early 20's and just out of college. Walter Olsen, M. Clemens' High's football coach.

As the trio drove along, the older occupants conversed freely and Johnny tried hard to understand what they were saying. Before long, according to Jablonski, the subject came around to football.

Turning to the coach, the proud father remarked, "Some day Johnny boy here will be a star on your football team." The coach smiled, little dreaming the father's ambition would some day come true.

### Fathers Sees Him

Jablonski continues on to reveal "Johnny Boy" eventually played football under coach Fama Pineski, and was watched with a smile as his son turned in one stellar performance after another on the Bay City team.

But the father didn't live to see the boy later gain the highest dream of every football player. Jablonski writes, "selection on the All-American football team."

The following season Johnny clinched a regular job on the M. Clemens Varsity when against Grosse Pointe, in his first kicking attempt, he booted one 62 yards out of bounds on the Grosse Pointe 18. Johnny was a quarterback in those days.

### Moves Onward

Johnny was a phoe at West Point, when his dad died on route home from California.

"The loss saddened the boy," Jablonski says, "but he was determined to carry out his father's ambition."

We don't have to go into a description on what Johnny has done as a Michigan State football player. His accomplishments, at least, today need no repetition. They're familiar to every one who has followed the Spartan grid fortunes.

The other day we stopped to congratulate Johnny on his selection to play with the Eastern All Stars, January 2, and also on his winning All American honors.

Johnny smiled. He was overlaid with both honors. Nevertheless, there was a lump in his throat.

"See, Scoop, I wish all my dad were still here to realize all that he had hoped for has come true," Johnny slowly revealed.

### Fine Character

"However, the great grief was as just the type the younger Pingel is," Jablonski points out, "can be gained from an explanation in his own words in a letter to Olsen."

In spite of the fact that I've been invited to the East-West game and named on the A.P. All-American, I'm able to wear the same size hat that I always have, seven and one-eighth," he wrote.

Truer words never were written.
