PTA's Hear Henderson

Dr. W. D. Henderson spoke Thursday evening at a joint meeting of the Central and Bailey Parent-Teacher association held at the East Lansing high school auditorium.

He urged parents to know the individual child, and to educate him so as to buttress his good traits. Henderson formulated an arch of character, considering truthfulness and honesty as the foundation, self-reliance, self-respect, courage and courtesy as the supports, and charity as the keystone of the arch.

Doctor Henderson illustrated his lecture with a wealth of references to his personal experience as a lecturer for 30 years. He has also been a lecturer at the University for 35 years. With a talk at Grand Rapids February 10, he completes 30 years of lecturing, and plans to return to a home in California.

Brown Will Begin New Class In Spanish

Henry Francis Brown, Latin teacher, will begin a course in "Conversational Spanish" under the auspices of the People's university. Mr. Brown recently returned from a trip abroad, where he traveled through Portugal, Spain, Italy and the countries of southern France.

Brown's life has been devoted to a study of Spanish-speaking nations and also of the language itself. At an early age he lived in South America and since then has spent the major portion of his time in Mexico and Central and South America. He has been in almost all of the Latin American states. As a result his class in Spanish will be taught with an accent perfected through familiarity with the language.

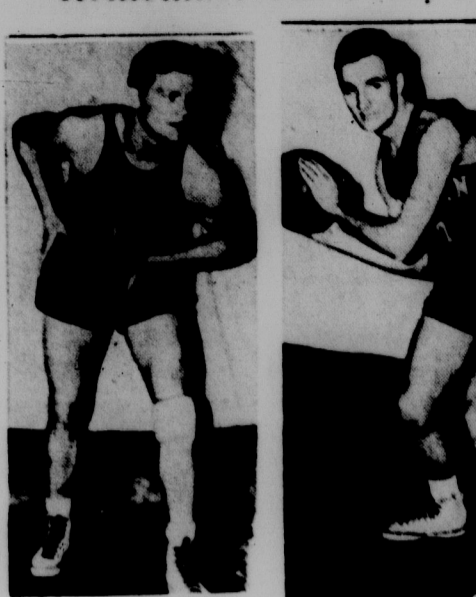

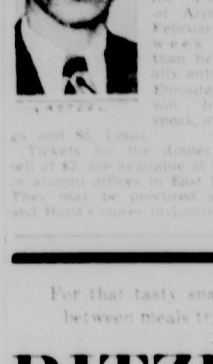
