'Flu' Tests Sportsmanship

With colds and influenza as prevalent as they now are on campus, students are given an opportunity to test their sense of fair play in an unusual way. Colds and 'flu' are spread through personal contacts with other persons. Every student affected has a duty to perform in preventing the spreading of the disease. Among ambitious students there is of course a great temptation to keep on working when one has a cold. The ambition of such persons may be commendable, but their common sense and sportsmanship may not be. It is a student's own business what he does, but if he has no regard for himself, he should at least have some for his fellowmen with whom he comes in contact. Such an epidemic, if it can be called that, involves good sportsmanship on the part of all who are afflicted with either disease. Dr. C. F. Holland, of the college health service, recently said, "Certainly any person owes it to his neighbor to help prevent the spread of the disease." Thus it is that every person who has a cold or influenza should, for the sake of others, be a good sport and stay inside until he is well again. Those who are well should also play fair and respect the isolation placed upon ill persons by college health officials. Cooperation on the part of everyone will be instrumental in preventing the spread of colds and influenza. Students with a sense of fairness on the athletic field, in the classroom, and in other contacts should be good sports when the health of several thousand other individuals is involved.—M. M. A.

Eight new campus boxing champions were crowned before a crowded crowd of 1,000 people who jammed into the gymnasium for the finals of the All-College tournament yesterday.

A pair of battling 165-pounders, Bill Chapman and Bill Morgan, provided the top entertainment when they staged a three-round battle the likes of which have never been seen in a Spartan ring before.

The two boys slugged it out for three minutes in a wild, furious exchange that had the blood-thirsty spectators on their feet for the full three minutes of every round. They waded through the first round on even terms, with both turning loose powerful rights and well-aimed lefts.

Chapman got just as fast with Morgan going to the canvas three times.

Judges L. L. Fenwick and Dr. C. H. Betton scored the bout evenly on points, but Referee Don Ross awarded Chapman the decision on his more consistent and heady attack.

The closest rival to the Chapman-Morgan fight for thrills from the spectators was the 147-pound class, between Bill Hagan and L'Anse Wilkins. Science was thrown to the wind along with the majority of the right hand "haymakers" with Hagan enjoying the upper hand.

Harold Fritz scored the only knockout when he stiffened Frank Weaver in 141 of the second round after an opening salvo that was followed on even seconds by Carl Thompson, a clever hard-hitting sophomore who came out with the variety in the 135-pound class to the Syracuse meet Saturday, gave the best scientific boxing exhibition of the program in his match with Bob Saucier. He displayed a two-fisted attack that he backed up with a strong left jab to win all three rounds, and the fight.
