**Fleeting Scholars Must be Stopped Educator Says**  
New York City, N. Y. (AP)—"Educational cafeterias" which do not give their students a well-balanced diet of learning have been given a stiff jolt by Dr. Walter A. Jessup, president of the Carnegie Foundation for the Advancement of Learning.

And the way to prevent all this, Dr. Jessup maintains, is to further restrict enrollments. His report said:

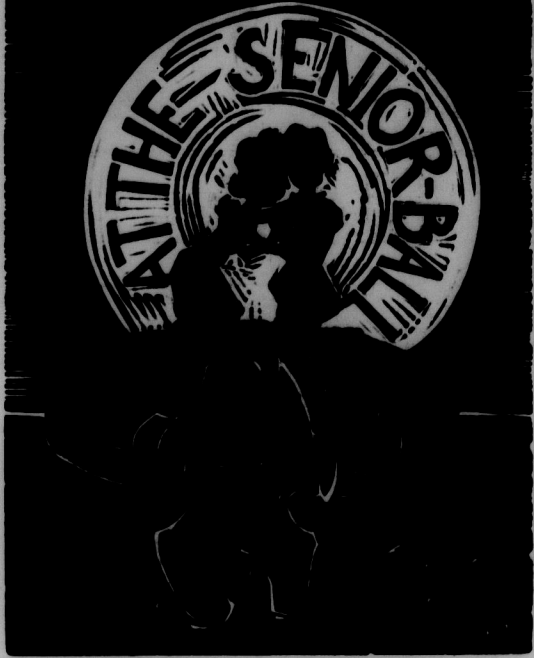

But we hope that perhaps there is a fringe of uncertainty in their effort, for in some of these same colleges which are carrying on this noble campaign, Negroes are prohibited to enter as students. Other colleges prohibit them from taking libraries common to the white student, others just plainly snub them. Let's clean up our own back yard before we start on Europe. Thank God we live on a campus where race prejudice is a thing of the past.
