Senate Bill Threatens Library

East Lansing Public Library's quarterly state aid payments may be suspended if a bill now being considered by the senate finance committee is passed.

The bill, introduced March 15 by Senator Flynn, Cadillac, proposes to suspend the public library act of 1938 providing for state aid to public libraries for the two fiscal years ending June 30, 1940, and June 30, 1941.

Under the 1937 act, all public libraries in the state have received quarterly payments from the state beginning July 1, 1938. The Flynn bill aims to suspend these payments for the two fiscal years as an economy measure.

East Lansing's public library has received three such quarterly payments, amounting to \$82.29 each. Another is due before June 30.

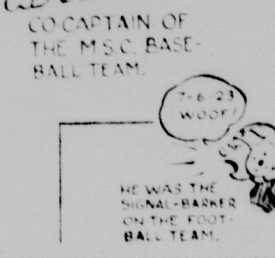
