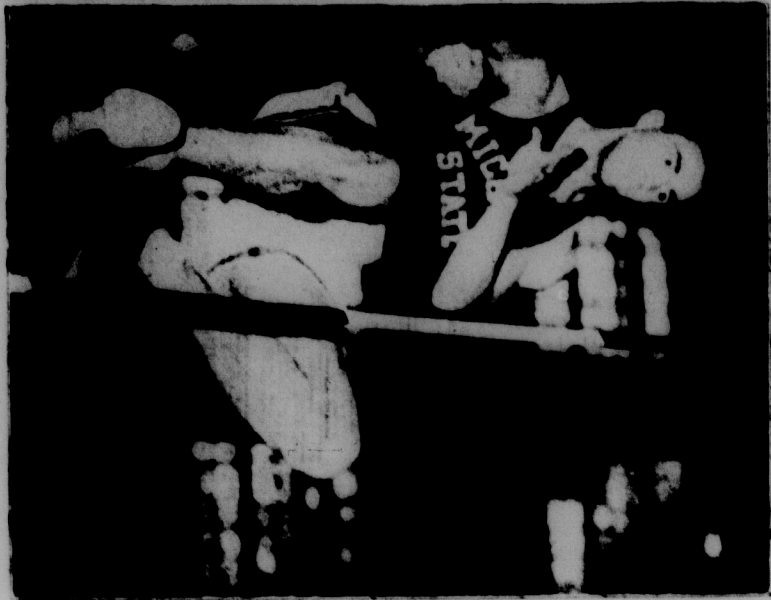

Plenty of water passed under the proverbial bridge between the day in 1917 when Charles Lupton leaped 6 feet 1/2 inch to set a varsity high jump record at Michigan State and last Saturday when Walter Arrington smashed the mark.

For one thing during the 22 years that elapsed Michigan State grew up. No longer is State known as "the farmer school" or "the cow college." Its enrollment today of 3,200 is a far cry from what it was when Lord attended school.

Then, too, the Spartans faculty are nationally recognized in intercollegiate athletic competition—something which didn't hold true a quarter of a century ago. Also, State now possesses more than a small wooden building to house its athletes, and to coach them, employs a staff of 15 men in contrast to the corps of two mentors in 1917.

It wasn't State didn't boast of good jumpers which resulted in the mark's long life. The Spartan system itself had a slight better-than-average leaper before Arrington stepped into the picture, but eventually the Indiana man, clinging to it.
