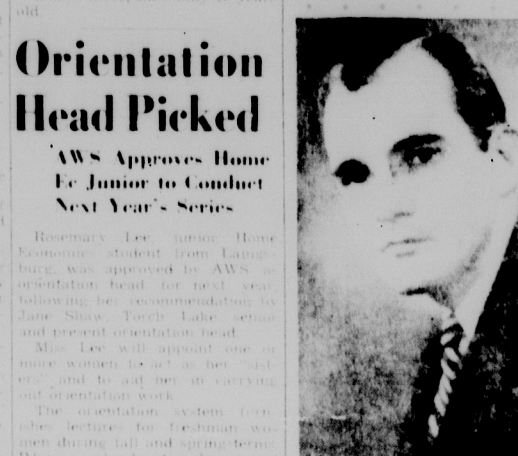

With Greer out State will lose eight or ten certain points in its remaining three dual meets which Greer definitely will miss and possibly as many points in the State Intercollegiate 1-2-4-A Central and National colli-gates.

His relegation to the sidelines also means Greer must pass over next Saturday's important intercollegiate dash at the Penn Relays. Further it means the loss of public praise for himself and also all an honor for his school.

Hurts Relays

The pulled muscle in Greer's left leg broke up State's crack 440 and 880-yard relay teams, which with Greer running the anchor leg, were good enough to earn into the money against any opposition. Without Greer, the relay hopes for two top prizes are shot.

Greer himself realizes, and he does so in a non-boasting manner, how vital a cog he is to State's track team.

Hobbling into Athletic Director Ralph H. Young's office yesterday, Bill remarks, "Well, I guess somebody else is going to win those handsome watches we were planning to bring home from the Penn Relays."

There might have been some personal glory for one in carrying the 100-yard dash, but Ed had much prefer doing his bit to help the 440 and 880-yard relay teams come in the winners.

That in itself stamped Greer a team man and not an individualist. Through his desire to win, Greer, more than once in the past has made it possible for co-sportmen on relay teams to gain their letters by overcoming large handicaps to break the tape.

Will be Slower

It is probable Greer should encounter a setback at the stage in his career. Before he pulled the muscle, the Spartan speedster was the foremost midwestern college sprinter and also among the top three in the nation.

When the return of his blow this season Greer likely will not be as fast as the sprinter. But history in sport reveals the recovered performer need time and his return, his future stride, frequently is slower than his former class.

The injury will, a doctor on Greer's staff says, be the worst record in the sport. He says Greer came within a tenth of a second of the mark at Penn when his leg cracked later in 33 seconds. He was beaten by another 33 hundredths at Kansas and he pulled up last year.

Greer has phenomenal endurance. He has won 100-yard dashes at the Penn Relays, the Michigan State meet, and the Intercollegiate. He has also won the 220-yard dash at the Penn Relays and the Michigan State meet.

Greer Pulls Muscle, Lost to Team for Three Weeks

Loss Forces Revamping Of Teams

Yovonovitz Hits Hurdle at Kansas And is Slowed Up

Fate struck a crushing blow to Captain Wilbur Greer and the Michigan State track team when they were set for their season's best triumph at the Kansas Relays Saturday.

Greer was driving hard a yard or so from the tape with a prized victory in hand over the dusky national college champion, Mervyn Mertes in the 100-yard dash when a muscle gave way in his left leg to send him limping across the finish line nosed out by a hair by Riethe in the lightning time of 9.3 seconds.

Not only did a quick fate deny Greer a sweet victory but it also wrecked the good possibilities of Spartan victories in the two sprint relay meets. It is expected Greer will be out three weeks.

LOSES STRIDE

Earlier in the day hustling Rudy Yovonovitz, who was making the top in a leg on the half mile team, also was competing in the 100-yard dash. He was thrown off stride by a strong wind and crashed into a hurdle and banged up a knee.

This injury slowed up Yovonovitz considerably but he ran on the quarter mile team with Danny Rowland, L. W. Armstrong and Bill Carpenter. This quartet made an exceptionally fine showing by placing third but with the fleet-footed Spartan captain in there a first place would not have been far off.

The bad breaks forced the reorganizing of the half mile team, which the Spartans were defending champions.

PLANS UNCERTAIN

The sudden turn of events forces revamping of this week's plans for the Penn and Drake Relays, Friday and Saturday. Coach Ralph Young was entering Greer in the Penn Relays along with a crack sprint team but now his plans are rather uncertainly although it is expected that Spartans will compete in both meets.

Fate also played her bad tricks on the Spartan team at home. John Swain, junior hurdler, suffered a severe sprain just prior to the start of the week and with Bob Godfrey's rather unsteady showing on the 100-yard dash, the Spartan hurdle relay team is virtually hobbled.

But it was not all gloom in the Spartan camp. The four mile team captured its first victory by a wide margin, as hundred yards in 16:00 to beat the 16:10 of the Penn Relays. The time turned in was: Ed Van Aaken, 4:30; Bill Mansfield, 4:30; Dick Frey, 4:33 and Ed Frey, 4:34.

ARRINGTON STARS

Up with a good day for State's top runner was the junior star, Walter Arrington. He turned in his best work when he scored 24 feet 4 inches to place second and to break the varsity mark held by Assistant Athletic Director Dittmore.

In addition Arrington passed his week end course, high jump, second in time, two feet more in six feet dash, and came in first in a 100 yard dash.

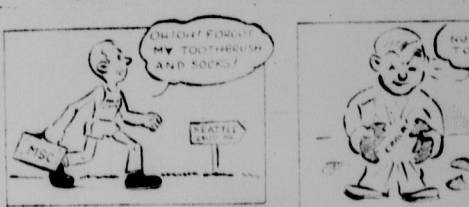
TOPS CATCHERS

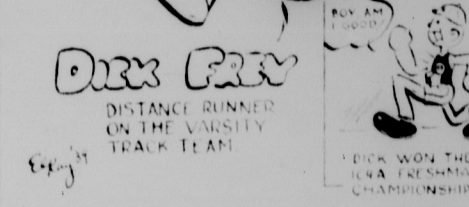

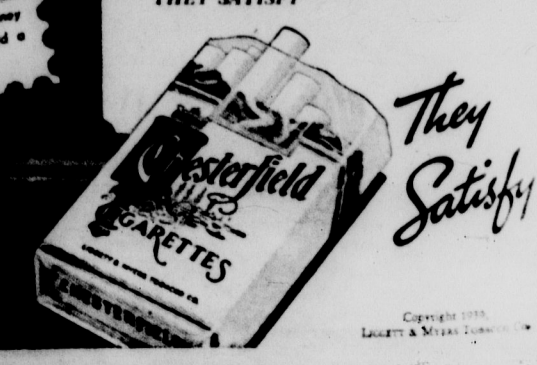
