Should the City Wage War on 'Skeeters'?

East Lansing a mosquito free city! Well, perhaps not entirely free, but a great reduction in their numbers.
 That is what is promised in a mosquito control program presented by Donald Schang to the East Lansing city council at its last meeting. The council held the program for further discussion, but promised Schang an early decision.
 The action by the council was a wise move. None of the members would consider himself a mosquito expert, and the delay will allow them to consult experts on the feasibility of the program.
 Since the program involves both public spending and cooperation, it also will allow council members to consult residents both as to how they feel about the measure and to what they think of the city's spending \$1,200 on such a program.
 However, these reasons for delay are not good reasons for failing to take steps to reduce East Lansing's mosquito population. That such a move has value is obvious.
 East Lansing is a residential city, and as such will reap economic returns for any measure making it better for residential purposes.
 No one will deny that freedom from mosquitoes makes a city more comfortable. Nor will anyone deny that East Lansing has more than its share of the insects each summer. Is it not logical that a reduction in their number would help draw more residents? With a \$600,000 housing project to be filled this summer, such a question deserves consideration.
 The sum desired would increase city taxes to no great extent and probably would benefit the city enough to make it advisable for the city to accept the program, should it be found workable.—S. M. A.

East Lansing Track Team Bows Before Lansing Central Thinclads

Tennis, Golf Squads Split; Baseball Nine to Open Against Resurrection

Big Reds Too Strong
Although conquered, 55½-48½, East Lansing high school's track team came the closest it ever has to whipping Lansing Central's Big Reds when the rival thinclads clashed at Pattengill stadium yesterday.

The outcome also was a moral victory for the Trojans in that they aren't very many Class B schools which come within seven points of deadlocking a Class A school, enjoying the power boasted by Central.

Ron Mead was East Lansing's hero. The state sprint champion coasted to victories in both the 100 and 220-yard dashes and ran the anchor leg on the Trojans' winning half-mile relay team. His time in the century was 19 flat and in the furrow, 2:33.

One Trojan varsity record was smashed when Dick Morris overtook the 440-yard run in 34½, beat the old mark of 35¼ rung up by Johnny Miller in 1938. Jack Murphy accounted for East Lansing's only other first by triumphing in the mile.

Golf Squad Loses
Although East Lansing's tennis team triumphed over Lansing Eastern, the Trojan golfers failed to do as well in their first encounter, losing to the Quakers by 10-7 strokes. The winners rapped up a total of 369 shots to 276 by the Trojans.

Bob Tamsey was top man in the East Lansing scoring, getting an 87. He scored individual honors likewise to Mike Skantz of Eastern. Dick Wood scored 90, Jack Loring 98, and Bill Seay 99, to round out the East Lansing entry.

East Lansing swept through the singles in decisive fashion, with Dick Davis, No. 2 man, leading the way. Davis conquered Oberler, the Eastern ace, in straight sets, 6-0, 6-1.

East Lansing's contribution yesterday was \$528 bringing the total raised for the city to \$3,619 or 73 per cent of the allotment. Of that, the college under the supervision of Dean H. D. Dirks has given \$2,702 and the city exclusive of the college has contributed \$917.

The last two days have shown an increase in activity among the solicitors and a like increase in money given. Tuesday 42 per cent of the total had been contributed and yesterday the score stood at 73 per cent, an increase of 31 per cent in two days. This was the largest increase in a like period since the drive began April 18.

Greater Lansing was running about 74 per cent of its total as workers intensified efforts to hit the goal set by the leaders. Announcement was made during yesterday's meeting that "emergency" pledges designed to help put this year's drive over the top were being distributed to all campaign workers. They were then asked to go back to their people and ask for additional pledges to help out in this emergency.

In addition, "punch hit" books were distributed, each containing 10 coupons of \$1 each. These coupons will be sold all over the community as an additional means of raising money for the chest.

Campaign organization members, agency board members, and executives as well as various clubs and organizations throughout the city have signified their willingness to take these books and attempt to dispose of them.
