## Trojan Golf Squad Wins From Reds

With Bob Tansey leading the way, East Lansing high school's golfers battled through a stiff wind yesterday to down Lansing Central by 23 strokes at the Hills golf course.

The Trojan linksmen compiled a total of 371 strokes against the opposition's 394, in their final match before invading Ionia Saturday to participate in the state regionals.

Tansey and his opponent, Hammond, were the only players to break 80. Hammond got in with an 88. Billy Searl, No. 1 Trojan, posted a 90, while Charles McCuen had 94, and Jack Ewing, 100, to round out the East Lansing scores.

Other scores fashioned by Central players were 104 by Smith and Judge and 98 by Sifianski.

## Trackmen Take Rest Before Regionals

With the state regionals at Grand Rapids only two days off, East Lansing high school's crack track team will take things easy today and tomorrow, according to Coach L. C. Shaver.

The Trojan mentor sees no reason for overworking his charges who already have been installed as "the team to beat" for the 1939 State Class B championship. Beating East Lansing by a point.

At the regional and state meets approach, the boys around the high school already have it doped out the Trojans will collect at least 35 points in each meet—which should win for them with plenty to spare.

They can't see how Ron Mead will miss taking first in both the 100 and 220-yard dashes. Most of the boys anticipate Mead's shattering of the century mark in the state meet which now stands at 13.2 seconds. He already has stepped the distance once this spring in 9.9 seconds.

Then there is Jack Murphy, a fast-stepping miler, who is good enough to pace in any man's meet. Dick Morris also looms as a sure bet to crack the "select" group in the 440-yard dash, barring something unforeseen.

Brown in the shot put and Wayne Leshar, a broad jumper, should be in there among the leaders, while Sharp and Dodge, a pair of fifty hurdles, Graham, a dash man, Eldridge, broad jumper, and Roundage, a shot putter, won't be lacking brilliant 880-yard relay success.

Finally, of course, there is East team which hasn't dropped a start this season. Graham, Mead, Dodge and Morris compose the quartet which will bear watching on the State track a week from Saturday.

## Structure Is Second In Month

East Lansing continues its business building boom today, with announcement that another new structure is scheduled to rise on M. A. C. avenue just off Grand River. This is the second business structure to be begun here this month.

Destruction of the frame buildings on M. A. C. avenue, just off Grand River, is slated to begin today to make room for a modern brick structure to be completed on that site by next fall.

Co-owners of the building are V. M. Shoemith, 413 Hillcrest, who is putting up three stores, and Prof. F. W. Fabian, 506 Marshall, and assistant professor and research associate in bacteriology at the college, who is erecting two stores.

There will be apartments over all five stores and over Byrnes Drug store. The apartments will number 15 in all and will consist of one to three rooms. Entrance to them will be on M. A. C. avenue.

The stores will measure 64 feet in depth and will be 13 or 15 feet wide. The same type of store that is in the present buildings will occupy the structure to be built.

The building will be brick and of fireproof construction. C. E. Hodge, Lansing contractor, has been hired for the job. It is estimated by the owners that the value of this project will be in the neighborhood of forty or fifty thousand dollars.
