Increased Attendance Anticipated During Summer School

Annual Short Session Will Open June 19; To Close July 28

Between 1,500 and 2,000 students will attend this year's summer session at Michigan State college, Prof. S. E. Crowe, director of the summer school, said late Wednesday. Last year about 1,500 attended.

The 26th annual summer school will open June 19, and will run six weeks, closing July 28. Three weeks post session will open July 31 and will close August 18. Professor Crowe said.

Regular college students who plan to remain for the hot weather session may begin on Thursday, Wednesday, Tuesday and Friday of final examination week the director added.

Because of the shortness of the session, numbers of those having each subject in Michigan. Non-credits are considered a full year, while total credits are not earned if a student is absent more than 10 days.

College for credit may be earned Monday, June 26, and courses may be dropped without penalty up to Monday, June 27. Any change must be made in the office of the director.

Women may receive up to 15 credit hours for private homes. Men may receive up to 12 credit hours for private homes.

Weekend education will be featured during the summer school. One of the courses scheduled for Saturday is Greenfield Village, Detroit.
