This is a criticism of a book I have not read—a review of John Steinbeck's "Grapes of Wrath." I do not intend to read it. I have glanced through a copy, have read a chapter reprinted in the "Saturday Review of Literature," and am acquainted with some of the author's earlier novels. I shall not err again. I have looked at the reviewers' comments upon "The Grapes."

Most critics think it is the Great American Novel or the Near-Great American novel. As "Time" says of it, with "Times' vaunted accuracy and brevity, "it is not."

But it appears that the time has come when we must consider Steinbeckian realism-naturalism as an important literary force. Pleasant though it may be for some of us to adjectivize the name of the author of "Of Mice and Men," the public buys his books. Why? Perhaps because the American public is the most sentimental of publics, and John Steinbeck, despite the fire-and-brimstone words that come from his typewriter, verily is a sub-brother.

He bleeds and weeps for imbeciles, murderers, paupers, one and all, and he is what G. K. Chesterton called a Comrade of the Dawn; he awaits a collective time paradise. For him there is but one side to every question, his—dispossessed farmers, never wholly victims of a system, never simply improvident or incapable, Steinbeck never allows reason to interfere with his realism.

Many of Steinbeck's prolix pages carry unobtainable a sense of reality, despite frequent phrases that do not ring true. For the author labors without stop over the material of common experience—experience as common

Council to Get Public Hearing

A new housing ordinance to control, regulate and license rooming houses and tourist homes within the city will be brought before the city council for public hearing Monday, June 26.

The ordinance, introduced May 22 by Ald. Fred T. Mitchell, of 72 of student rooming houses regardless of the number of roomers. It provides rigid inspection and cooking facilities to be made in the same manner as a person's home.

According to the ordinance, which will be in effect July 1, all of the city's rooming houses must be made suitable for occupancy.
