Lectures on the various subjects will be given every other week, according to Miss Lee.

Our hundred strong M. S. C. band will step out in full regalia for the first time this year at the Wayne state game Saturday. Under the direction of Leonard Falcone, band director at Michigan State for fourteen years, the band has been hard at work all afternoon and evening all this week in preparation for this Saturday's game.

Because of lack of sufficient rehearsal time the band will be unable to present any complicated formations at the ball game in the stadium. However, under the leadership of Major Mark H. Dohy, drill master, and Mr. Falcone, the organization has been polishing up its fundamental marching technique and will be due to put on its regular show of stunts and games.

Speaking of the band's activities for the year, Mr. Falcone said: "In the fall term we concentrate on football games and during the winter stress concert music. We play for major basketball games and furnish the large part of the music for Farmers' Week. In the spring we give a series of weekly concerts in the band shell along with military parades and major athletic events." In keeping with

planned, the uniform is of a military type and is patterned after the U. S. Army uniform.

Staff Changes Announced in Liberal Arts

Faculty changes in two Liberal Arts departments and additional summer study done by instructors have been announced by L. C. Emmons, dean of the division.

Paul L. Drennon of the mathematics department spent the year 1938-39 on leave of absence studying at the University of Michigan, where he received his Ph.D. degree in June. He is now back at the University of Chicago, working on the evaluation program of the Progressive Education Association. Doctor Drennon has been granted six months' leave of absence to continue this work.

Professor W. D. Bates, also of the mathematics department, has been granted six months' leave of absence to study analysis of variance in London, England.

New appointments in the mathematics department include: Dr. Richard Beth, associate professor, who formerly taught at Worcester Polytechnic Institute and received his doctorate from Hamburg, Germany; Richard V. Hamming to teach during Doctor Drennon's absence; and David H. Shuttle and Frank Nadel as full-time instructors. Hamming is a graduate of the University of Chicago, as is Shuttle. Nadel is a graduate of Union college.

Three new instructors have been added to the sociology department, according to Dean Emmons.

Faculty to Have Freshman Class Larger Than University's

With 1941 first term, students on the campus the freshman enrollment of Michigan State college has now surpassed that of the University of Michigan, Kermit Smith, assistant registrar, announced yesterday.

It is expected to be added that the number of undergraduates at Michigan State will surpass those of the university not only in enrollment figures but also in the number of students who are employed.

Although late registration still is continuing, Smith said, enrollment at Michigan State for the first term of 1939-40 is now 10,000. The enrollment at the University of Michigan for the same term was 9,800.

Faculty to Have Activity Books

This year, for the first time, faculty activity books are being distributed to the student activities books. This is the first time that the faculty has had the double coupon system.

Under the Wire

BERLIN, Sept. 27.—German officials reported the unconditional surrender of Warsaw Wednesday. More than 100,000 soldiers, after a 26-day battle, became German prisoners.

PHILADELPHIA, Sept. 27.—Gov. Cleveland Bergdol, testifying today before an army court-martial for dodging the draft in 1916, stated that he had been in the United States twice before his recent return from Germany. In 1929, he claimed, he returned to this country for a stay of four years, and in 1935 he entered for a three-year visit.

WASHINGTON, Sept. 27.—Government officials were of the opinion that the assembly fight would come into open debate before congress on Thursday. Unofficially, President Roosevelt is credited with 57 votes for repeal, enough to carry through his program.

LONDON, Sept. 27.—Winston Churchill, English First Lord of the Admiralty, denied German claims of having bombed and sunk a British airplane carrier. Admitting the attack, Churchill claimed that one German ship had been brought down, with no damage to the British ship.

Old Livestock Pavilion To House Laboratories

Judging rings in the old livestock pavilion are to be used as laboratories, Professor Musselman of the department of agricultural engineering, announced yesterday.

A Student Union But...
 For several terms the line in the Union cafeteria has been growing longer day by day until it has reached such a point that if one has an 11 o'clock class or tries to eat at 6 o'clock in the evening, he has to wait 35 minutes standing in line.
 Taking a lead from one of the students who was in line last week, a survey was made to determine how many students, how many faculty and how many outsiders were in line. Not once were those in line asked whether or not they were students. The survey was conducted on three different days.
 This is what the survey showed: that 43 per cent of those in line were Lansing people who were in no way connected with the college, 39 per cent were students, 18 per cent were faculty or college employees.
 To say it is a regrettable situation, is putting it mildly. Primarily, the Union cafeteria is for students, then for the faculty and then for outsiders. But the survey refutes this basic fact decidedly.
 Another fact that must be considered is that the cafeteria was initiated with the sole purpose of giving the students and faculty a chance at lower cost meals. It was not intended to compete with private business, but only to aid the students.
 It is possible that the Union management is not aware of these facts but similar surveys will be run to demonstrate the veracity of statements contained in this writing.
 It is certain that the crowded conditions scare away students and faculty from eating in their Union catering to the satisfaction of outsiders. When one has only an hour in which to eat a meal, he does not want to wait half an hour in line, particularly when there is no cause for it.
 To solve this problem, two alternatives are offered. Enlarge the facilities so that the cafeteria can take care of the crowded condition, or else work out a plan whereby the students and faculty may purchase coupon books. Then only these coupon books would be accepted for payment, thus fulfilling the designed purpose for which it was initiated.
 Let it be truly a student Union.

Local Buildings Near Completion

New Building Opens Doors Saturday

Two More Structures Scheduled to Open Within Two Months

With the formal opening of the Hicks block this Saturday, East Lansing begins to see the effects of a building boom begun early in the spring. Located in the Hicks block are the Hicks Dry Cleaning Co., and Jim Brakeman's broetry and men's shop. Approximate cost of the new building will be \$28,000, according to Earl E. Hicks, owner.

Another construction project, adjacent to Hyman's Drug store, will be completed approximately October 15.

This building will have five store fronts on M.A.C. avenue, and 15 apartments on the second floor. A dry cleaning establishment, beauty parlor, and barber shop will occupy three of the stores.

Construction of a modern two-story business place on the corner of Abbott road and Grand River is now under way. Part of the building, into which M. K. O'Connor's 10 cent store will move, is scheduled to be finished about November 25.

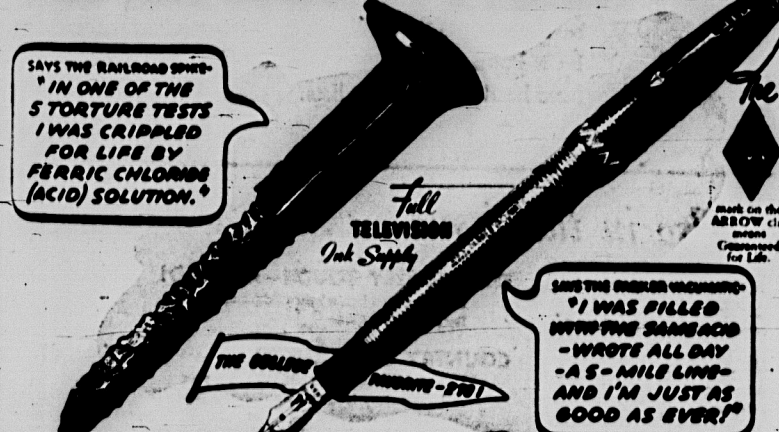

Although Wayne university's hopes for victory over State received a severe blow this week in the loss of Capt. Frank Cudillo, the Tartars will still present a formidable aggregation on Macklin field Saturday afternoon.

With an excellent line that will probably outweigh State's highly touted forward wall, Coach Joe Gembis hopes to have his strongest Wayne team in four years.

Gembis has estimated his team's strength as much greater than last year and although Cudillo's loss will weaken the Tartars considerably, a much closer battle than last year is expected.

Three excellent sophomore tackles, Tom Callard, Ralph Betker and Bill Cassidy, and two guards, Ed Larimore and Jerry Schenkler, are the two main reasons Gembis hopes for a stronger team.

Only two of the starters in last year's fray will appear in the opening lineup Saturday. They are Jerry Sevek, end, and Pat Savage, tackle. Promising sophomores have showed other last-year regulars out of the starting front.

Speed will be the password in the Wayne backfield for without Cudillo the Detroit school lacks a good all-around backfield man. Bob Luby, Tom Adams, and Cudillo's replacement, Carl Nagy, are all speed merchants in the 10-second class.

Like Coach Bachman, Gembis plans to use a lot of replacements during the contest as he is forced to experiment with untried sophomores in several positions. The Wayne mentor has three full sets of backs that he promises to change frequently, while many substitutions will probably be made in the line.
