A Student Union But...
 For several terms the line in the Union cafeteria has been growing longer day by day until it has reached such a point that if one has an 11 o'clock class or tries to eat at 6 o'clock in the evening, he has to wait 35 minutes standing in line.
 Taking a lead from one of the students who was in line last week, a survey was made to determine how many students, how many faculty and how many outsiders were in line. Not once were those in line asked whether or not they were students. The survey was conducted on three different days.
 This is what the survey showed: that 43 per cent of those in line were Lansing people who were in no way connected with the college, 39 per cent were students, 18 per cent were faculty or college employed.
 To say it is a regrettable situation, is putting it mildly. Primarily, the Union cafeteria is for students, then for the faculty and then for outsiders. But the survey refutes this basic fact decidedly.
 Another fact that must be considered is that the cafeteria was initiated with the sole purpose of giving the students and faculty a chance at lower cost meals. It was not intended to compete with private business, but only to aid the students.
 It is possible that the Union management is not aware of these facts but similar surveys will be run to demonstrate the veracity of statements contained in this writing.
 It is certain that the crowded conditions scare away students and faculty from eating in their Union catering to the satisfaction of outsiders. When one has only an hour in which to eat a meal, he does not want to wait half-an-hour in line, particularly when there is no cause for it.
 To solve this problem, two alternatives are offered. Enlarge the facilities, so that the cafeteria can take care of the crowded condition, or else work out a plan whereby the students and faculty may purchase coupon books. Then only these coupon books would be accepted for payment, thus fulfilling the designed purpose for which it was initiated.
 Let it be truly a student Union.

New Building Opens Doors Saturday

Two More Structures Scheduled to Open Within Two Months

With the formal opening of the Hicks block this Saturday, East Lansing begins to see the effects of a building boom begun early in the spring. Located in the Hicks block are the Hicks Dry Cleaning Co. and Jim Brakeman's bootery and men's shop. Approximate cost of the new building will be \$26,000, according to Earl E. Hicks, owner.

Another construction project, adjacent to Byrnes' Drug store, will be completed approximately October 15.

This building will have five store fronts on M.A.C. avenue, and 15 apartments on the second floor. A dry cleaning establishment, beauty parlor, and barber shop will occupy three of the stores.

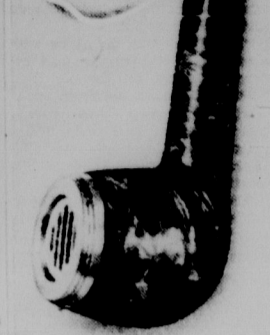

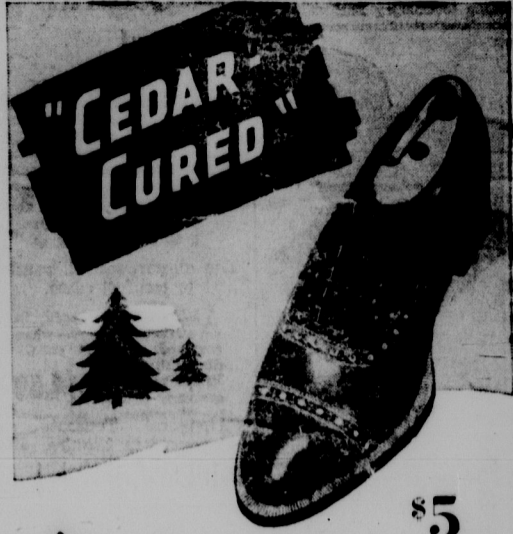
