

In recent years the great growth of the Michigan State student body has the greated the dangers. has increased the dangers of traffic and then too the traffic through East Lansing has grown at an alarming rate, Last night a car ran the red light and nearly hit a

Whether this is so is open to question but many others have complained that the traffic light is badly situated because it is in the center of the intersection and a stranger coming into East Lansing for the first time does not see the light. The fact that it is not suspended or located at the four corners of the intersection as are the majority of other traffic lights makes it increasingly difficult for the

Another dangerous factor in traffic here is the exces sive speed of many motorists coming into East Lansing from the east. Additional lights between Abbot and Haslett streets would slow up the cars as they approach the crowded district of the city.

Action by the city council and strict enforcement by the police department is to be commended and are the only ways that pedestrians can cross streets in safety,



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
