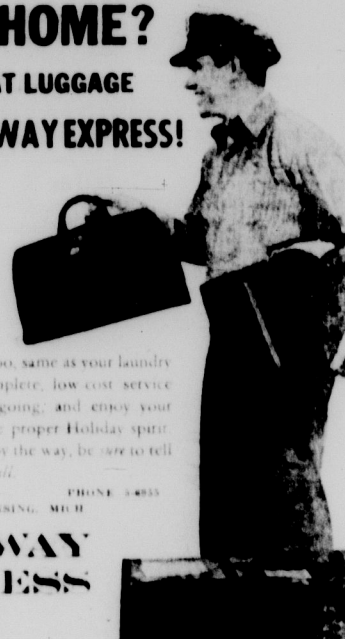

Washington, Dec. 12—Steno Vincent, charming, dusky president of Haiti, is being wined and dined in Washington this week under auspices far different from the reception of his predecessor, Louis Borno, in the twenties.

When President Borno departed from Haiti, the U. S. Marine corps band, serenading him on the dock, played, "Bye-Bye, Blackbird."

Later when President Borno passed Governor's Island, New York, the U. S. army failed to roar the required 21-gun salute. The oversight of it was an oversight almost caused an international incident, and General Charles P. Summerall, a native of Florida and commander of Governor's Island, got the blame.

When President Borno sailed back to Haiti, General Summerall himself stood beside the gun to see that the salute was given. And as the vessel passed the Statue of Liberty, the lieutenant gave the order to fire.

But the gun missed a faulty shell. The second gun was ordered to fire. It missed. Then, before they could be reloaded, both guns went off simultaneously.

NEW HAITIAN PRESIDENT
President Vincent did not come to the United States via Governor's Island, as there was no trouble over his salute. He flew via Miami. Also there was no trouble over his stopping at the Mayflower hotel in Washington.

That distinguished body, the House of Congress, sent a letter to "L'Etat Ed." Smith of South Carolina, who drew a very definite color line. However, the Haitian president was cordially and unconditionally received.

Next, he came to address the United States government in a grand hall and in the house in Haiti to guard the inter-continental of the Panama canal.

CAPITAL CHAIR
Haitian President, the handsome French monarch, is beginning to get in the face of the state department. He hangs around too much. An executive department wants in the conference report that nationalized sentiment has again with the Russian invasion of Finland, Sweden, and Norwegian in the northwest will never elect senators Stephen Now, et al. on all nationalistic platforms.

MERRY GO ROUND
United States, official agreement with the French writer, report that the committee among the Russians are even greater than in period. Red soldiers have advanced in drives, have taken dozens. However, they are hard to win by sheer weight of numbers. Russian drives are badly staffed and the organization of the troops is more political than military.

Madison, Wis.—(ACP)—Maintain good posture and you'll feel better. That's the prescription of the University of Wisconsin's Dr. Frances A. Hellebrandt, a member of the medical school staff.

"To stand correctly is extraordinarily cheap from the viewpoint of its energy needs," she said. "If the posture is relaxed, standing is practically indefatigable. It costs little more energy units to stand properly than to beat an egg, although nearly three-fourths of the muscles in the body are being used," Dr. Hellebrandt continued.

SPARTAN SPORTFOLIO

There are two people who are going to be very happy once Michigan State's new fieldhouse is completed. We are thinking of Ralph H. Young and Ben Van Alstyne.

Of course, they aren't the only ones who'll be pleased by any means. Other persons, including Jake Haubert, Charley Bachman, Fendley Collins and Brick Burhaus will be pretty joyful too. But we think Young and Van Alstyne have a little more reason to be pleased than the others.

For Young it will mean that his track team will have a chance to practice on a regulation dirt track of the sort it will run into in meets away from home. One of the greatest handicaps State's present track coach has had to contend with is the fact that he has had to drill his charges on the boards in the old gym and then complete a walk from home against teams which have been running on nothing else but dirt tracks since the start of practice.

Needless to say, this doesn't help Spartan chances any. There is quite a difference between running on dirt and running on boards, and you can't expect a team which has been drilled on boards to suddenly switch over to the dirt track without any loss of steam.

State Handicapped
