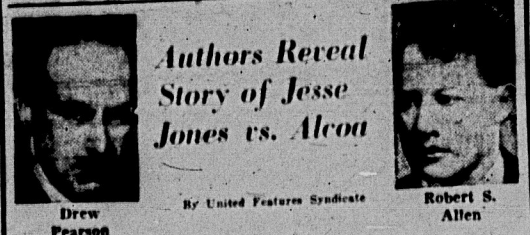

Joe Gembis, who is starting the 10th and probably most dismal of his head coaching years at Wayne university, will bring his team here pointed for the remote possibility of upsetting the Spartans.

As for Michigan State, Charley Bachman said Friday that he would start a new pair of ends against the Tartars, as the major alteration in the Spartan lineup.

One other change will see Walter "The Champ" Pawlowski at right half for the first time this year. Pawlowski, who was switched to left half at the beginning of the season, was switched back to the right half spot this week.

Keith Steffe, fleet sophomore reserve halfback from Sturgis, had been released from college hospital today following observation for a possible concussion.

Steffe, who had been performing with the white-shirted reserve forces was injured in Wednesday's practice while making a tackle. The Sturgis athlete, whose 145 pounds is light for the left half post, was a member of the freshman baseball team last spring.

Prizes to List Ten Medals, Five Fowl

If you're interested in winning a turkey, goose, duck, chicken or goose egg, enter your group in the Turkey Trot next month.

One of the most popular of intramural athletic affairs throughout the nation, this event will make its appearance at Michigan State this year for the first time. Scheduled as the first part of the All-college indoor fall track meet, the Turkey Trot will be run on Monday, Nov. 17.

The Turkey Trot is a midget version of a regulation cross-country run. It is to be run over a two-mile course and will be scored in the regulation cross-country manner in which the team with the lowest score wins.

Team prizes will be awarded the first five teams of four to finish the run. First place will win the turkey, second place the goose, third place the duck, fourth place the chicken, and fifth place the fowl. In addition, individual medals will be awarded to the first 10 runners to complete the course.

Since the Turkey Trot is to be an all-college event, any group is eligible to enter. The only eligibility restriction is that no person may enter who is a varsity or freshman track or cross country letter winner, or who is a member of the present varsity or freshman cross country or track teams.

A group may enter as many individuals as it likes, but only the first four to finish will count in the scoring. Groups wishing to enter the Turkey Trot must register with Russel Daubert, assistant director of intramural athletics, in room 230, Jenson gymnasium.

After registering with Daubert, entrants must complete the two-mile course four times before Nov. 19. Trial runs will begin on November 1 when entrants can check in at the college track south of the stadium to make their entrance runs.

Hoosiers to Challenge Unbeaten Harriers' Winning Streak

Meet Will Start At 11:30 a. m.

Racing over State's new 4 1/2 mile course, the undefeated Spartan cross country team will risk its record against its arch rivals, the University of Indiana, at 11:30 this morning. The new course is only slightly changed, but gives the spectators a much better picture of the race as the dialers will run an extra half mile on the track.

Led by Plee Freddie Wilt, All-American two-miler, the Hoosier Harriers will pit a green team against State's equally inexperienced squad. Ineligible, and consequently not running for Indiana's champion half-miler Campbell Kane who placed second in the dual meet last year. The rest of last year's Hoosier team graduated.

LOSES SEVERAL MEN The graduation of those good men has left Indiana with a poorly balanced team as last week's 26-30 defeat by Illinois indicated. After Wilt, who placed first, Hoosiers finished sixth, eighth, ninth, and tenth.

Indiana will probably meet State twice again during this campaign in the National Junior A. A. U. run at Detroit next week, and also when the Hoosiers defend their National Collegiate crown on November 25 at East Lansing.

graceful appearance while playing the carillon over.  
**CARILLON MUSIC IS NEW**  
Carillon music is relatively new to America, the first instrument having been installed in 1922. Westcott estimated that only 90 people have interested themselves in playing it. Beaumont tower's carillon has 23 bells which were made in Croyden, England, by Gillett and Johnston. The carillon originated in the low countries of Europe, and its music consisted of folk-songs of the people.  
Even today a large portion of the pieces especially arranged for the carillon are variations of those same songs, he said. He personally arranges all these compositions.  
**CARILLON CONFUSES MANY**  
Many people confuse the carillon with chimes, but this is incorrect, Westcott added. "The chimes are mechanical in tone and have no powers of expression and loudness of quality," he said.  
When the clock in Beaumont tower strikes the time, the musical notes one hears are from an automatic mechanism, separate from the carillon, according to Westcott.

Farmers' Day held August 1 concluded the M. S. C. summer convention season. This particular day is set aside annually by the agricultural department to enable farmers of the state to inspect the work of the college experiment station.
