CARILLON MUSIC IS NEW Carillon music is relatively new to America, the first instrument having been installed in 1922. Westcott estimated that only 90 people have interested themselves in playing it. Beaumont tower's carillon has 23 bells which were made in Croyden, England, by Gil-lett and Johnston. The carillon or-iginated in the low countries of Europe, stud its music consisted of folk-songs of the people.
