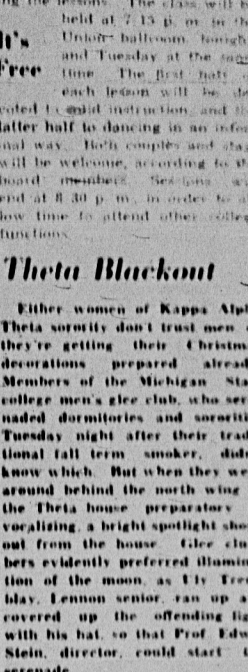

Washington Merry-Go-Round

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Committee Finds Japan Forming Army in U.S.

WASHINGTON—Senator Tom Connally has not wanted to throw any monkey wrenches into the "peace" negotiations with Japan, so has kept quiet the fact that his Foreign Relations committee has some startling evidence on Japanese subversive activities.

Submitted by Senator Guy Gillette of Iowa, author of the bill for a probe of these operations, the evidence reveals that while Special Envoy Kurusu has been talking amity, agents of his government have been organizing a secret pro-Axis army in the United States and Hawaii.

According to Gillette, three organizations are active in these subversive operations: the Japanese Military Service men's league, the National Citizens League, and the Japanese Imperial Brotherhood society.

WILL DIE FOR NIPPON

Gillette claims to have proof that two of these organizations have a group of 200 adherents, mostly in California and Hawaii. They are pledged to die for Japan. Also, he has evidence that all three organizations are carrying on activities to raise national defenses and have raised considerable sums for the Japanese army and navy.

A recent FBI raid on the headquarters of two other Japanese organizations in Los Angeles produced records showing that large amounts of money have been sent to Tokyo for the military forces. Gillette also has evidence that Japanese-Americans who refuse to join the fifth column units are being held in Japanese camps. He also has evidence that the secret army is to "investigate" the military age. Recently the Japanese Consul General in Hawaii sent a notice to agents of Japanese descent ordering them to register "the determined" under the Japanese draft law.

The order warned that anyone failing to register would be punished as a "resister" of the Japanese conscription law.

Nate, prominent Japanese-American, 100 percent loyal to the United States, has recently expressed these subversive activities. Coast Page, editor of a Pacific Coast Japanese newspaper, urges "immediate action by the United States government to halt all organizations and propaganda seeking to promote the pro-Nazi elements among us, such as the Japanese Military Service men's League."

Jap Troop Movements Leave Little Hope for Peace Talks

Japanese-American conferences have never reached a stage where peaceful negotiations could even be attempted. Secretary of State Hull delayed yesterday.

Hull's statement came only 24 hours after President Roosevelt handed Envoys No. 1, mura and Kurusu a formal request that Japan reply to his three-point ultimatum.

In the meantime, Japan's only troop concentration in Indo-China, as Thailand made tactical preparations for defense.

Washington spoke as much as expected the belief that Hull's statement and President Roosevelt's ultimatum place Japan in a position where she must either withdraw troops recently sent into Indo-China or face the possibility of an East Asian war.

To top off the crisis, the British battleship Prince of Wales and the first capital ship to join the British Far Eastern fleet steamed into Singapore at the head of a flotilla of smaller vessels.

Nazis in Full Retreat

With its army in retreat in the southern front, the German command rushed reinforcements to the Rostov area yesterday in an effort to show the Soviet advance.

Christmas had come 22 days early for the members of Michigan State's football squad today.

For the Spartans were en route to their homes in various sectors of East Lansing Wednesday afternoon with a variety of livestock ranging from chickens to geese and gifts of key chains, neckties, utility cases, and other items. They had just come from the annual football party given them at season's end by the Downtown Coaches club in Lansing.


Its coaches made short talks and all members of the Spartan varsity were presented at the yearly party. None of the State gridders went home empty-handed.

With the exception of the annual Grid Bust in college auditorium Dec. 13, that just about brought an official end to State's football season. Two consistent performers, Quarterback Willie Davis and Bluegrass Billy Rupp, regular guard, had been announced earlier in the day as the Spartans' 1941 co-captains.

Two of the best blockers on the State squad and both letter winners for three seasons, they are among the 12 seniors who will be lost this year. Davis, who was forced out of games three times this year because of injuries, but who still managed to start eight of nine games, and Rupp, who played 60 minutes twice, succeed another back and lineman, Jack Amon and Paul Griffith, who were co-captains of the 1940 eleven.

at an I. S. A. meeting Tuesday night when an election, provided for by a recently passed amendment to the group's constitution, was cancelled because a technicality in the by-laws made it invalid.

The amendment, providing for the election of a new roster of council officers, was passed at a special meeting, but, as was pointed out at Tuesday's meeting, the group's by-laws require that constitutional amendments be passed at regular meetings. On these grounds, the election was cancelled, and it appears likely that the present officers will serve for the rest of the school year.

TO INVESTIGATE ISA
Student Council President Tom Cornelli also took a hand in the I. S. A. meeting by declaring that the Student Council committee would be appointed to investigate the I. S. A.'s organization.

The Student Council constitution provides that upon the presentation of a petition, signed by three council members and the Dean of Men, an investigating committee may be appointed. Cornelli said that the committee would probably be named today and that its report would be made public.

Despite its inability to hold a new election and reorganize, as its "legal" amendment provided, the council remained in session for more than two hours, while members debated the advisability of admitting "proxy" votes and explained the constitution to each other.

Country's announcement that a Student Council committee would be appointed to investigate the I. S. A. climaxed the evening and brought the meeting to a close.

He Will Play Violin At State Tuesday

Zino Francescatti, internationally famous French violinist, will appear in college auditorium Tuesday, Prof. Roy Underwood, chairman of the M.S.C. concert series, said yesterday.

Francescatti was born in March, 1892, in Italy. Except for his father's training in both violin and piano, Francescatti is entirely self-taught. His father, born in Italy, was a pupil of the great violinist, Saverio.

At the age of 20 he made an official debut with the orchestra of the Conservatoire de Musique in Paris. He made a tour throughout the French provinces and appeared with leading orchestras on the continent. In the spring of 1936 he conducted a successful—South American tour.

In autumn, 1938 released by the French government to come to America as an unofficial ambassador of good will and Gallic culture, Francescatti visited the United States for the first time. He played with three major orchestras, the New York Philharmonic-symphony, the Chicago and the Cincinnati orchestras, all of whom reengaged him for 1940-41.

During the 1941 concert tour he will appear with the New York Philharmonic-symphony, the Chicago symphony and the Cincinnati and Pittsburgh symphonies, and the Rochester philharmonic.

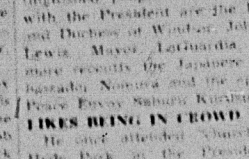

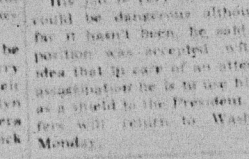

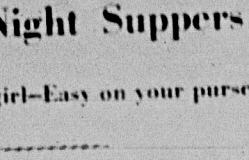
