
Smash 10 More Japanese Ships WASHINGTON, Oct. 29 (AP)

-American submarines cruising the Pacific have sunk 10 enemy vessels and damaged four oth-

The figures, contained in a communique issued at Secretary Knox's press conference, brought to 475 the number of Japanese ships sunk, probably sunk or damaged.

Knox also announced that improvement in the submarine situation in the Atlantic has made it possible to discontinue plan for construction of 427 vessels which would have been used in anti-submarine work and to use the costruction facilities thus released to build vessels for amphibious operations throughout the world.

The navy secretary also announced that with increasing activities in the Pacific it has been deemed advisable to improve repair facilities on the west coast. To free yards there for repair work, he said, construction of three cruisers, seven destroyers and nine fleet tugs had been transferred to east coast yards.




