Brown began his world travels as a stowaway on a steamer to South America. A year later he shipped as an able-bodied seaman to Black sea ports in Rus-

## UNDER THE WIRE

CHUNGKING, Oct. 29 (AP)—The Chinese announced today the smashing of the Japanese October offensive within the triangle of Shanghai, Nanking and Hankow in eastern China with the recapture of Siaofeng. More than 1200 Japanese were killed and remnants were forced to retreat.

LONDON, Oct. 29 (AP)—An Italian army of 30,000 trained fighters has been established in northern Italy and, with the aid of arms supplied through Yugoslav partisans, already has engaged German troops, a Swiss dispatch reported tonight.

MOSCOW, Oct. 29 (AP)—With some of the tri-power conference's most important business already completed, the representatives of Britain, Russia and the United States ended another lengthy session tonight in Moscow's Spiridonovka palace. (NBC and CBS correspondents in London said an official statement on the conference's results was expected from Moscow over the weekend.)

NEW YORK, Oct. 29 (AP)—Warner Bros. Pictures, Inc., announced today that a check for \$1,000,000, the first installment of the proceeds from the film "This Is the Army," had been turned over to army emergency relief, and predicted that by Jan. 1 the film will have netted \$5,000,000 for the fund. As a stage show, "This Is the Army" earned \$2,000,000 for the fund.

sia and then to North Africa. An injury and operation aboard ship ended his seafaring days and began his newspaper career. Free Lanced in Europe.

He has written for various papers, worked as a free lance magazine writer in Europe, written for the International News service in Rome, and been a radio correspondent for CBS. His articles have appeared in Life, Colliers, and the Readers Digest.

Brown was "on the scene" in Yugoslavia when the Nazis invaded the country, when the Greek king fled from the Germans, and when the desert warfare of the Syrian campaigns took place.

He was aboard the Republic British warship, when the Japanese sank it in the Pacific. His report of the torpedoing and rescue which he broadcast from Singapore a few hours after it occurred earned him the radio award which is comparable to the Pulitzer prize in journalism.

His experiences are tersely summed up in the cable he sent to Mrs. Brown shortly after he had arranged this broadcast. "In October the air force crashed me. In November an army truck plunged over a hill with me. In December the navy tried to sink me. Since no additional branches of the forces remain, don't worry."

WASHINGTON, Oct. 29 (AP)—President Roosevelt, describing the objective of the Moscow conference as peace in the world and an end to aggression, said today it has been a tremendous success.

Beaming and obviously elated over the reports from the American-British-Russian meeting, the chief executive told a press-radio conference that it was a great success not only in the definite agreements reached but in spirit.

Roosevelt also said: 1. The Moscow conference has reached the stage where the agreements are being reduced to formal documents which will be made public later, probably from Moscow.

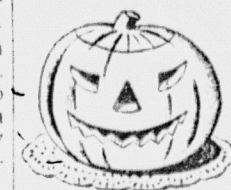
Battered copies of Encyclopedia Britannica and dusty almanacs claim that in England Halloween was the term used to describe the vigil of All Saints

## Allies Attempt Squeeze Play

### Russian Army Sweeps Ahead to Nikopol

Cavalry, Tanks Capture 80 Towns, Chase Nazis 15 Miles in Retreat

LONDON, Oct. 29 (AP)—Gen. Fedor Tolbukhin's Cossack horsemen and tanks chased a fleeing German army 15 miles farther across the Nogaik steppe today, sweeping through 80 more villages to within 25 miles of Nikopol on the lower Dnieper and to within 50 miles of the Perikop bottleneck at the top of the Crimea.

Over roads strewn with German dead and wrecked enemy armor, the Russians ran through Bolshaya-Bydozerka, 25 miles southwest of the Dnieper bend manganese center of Nikopol, in a drive to link up with Gen. Rodion Y. Malinovsky's troops moving down from Dnepropetrovsk.

A Berlin broadcast, recorded by the Associated Press, announced a new crossing of the Dnieper just below Zaporozhe by other Russian units driving on Nikopol.

At besieged Kirovograd, 50 miles west of Nikopol, the Russians beat off heavy enemy tank and infantry attacks.

Inactive last week, the off-campus Engineers will begin play today against the former junior ROTC team in the first game of the doubleheader which will start at 2:30 p. m. at Macklin field.

In an effort to extend their one victory over the Vets, the on-campus Engineers will battle the civilian team in the second of today's games.

Music for the half time and the flag raising ceremony at the doubleheader will be provided by the AST marching band.

Coch Kaval's veterans are out to make up for the tie of last Saturday's game with the civilians. If Pete Fornari and Bill Beardsley, ROTC ball carriers, can break loose, the Engineers may and themselves in hot water.

But the Engineers' heavier line may have something to say about it. The civilian on-campus Engineers game gives promise of being a close one. Both teams put up a fine showing Saturday.

### CDC Plans Magazine Drive for Invalid State Soldiers

Plans for the collection of magazines for soldiers hospitalized in Olin Memorial health center have been made by CDC, according to publicity chairman Margaret Peterson, Brooklyn junior.

The drive, which will begin next week, is to be directed by the CDC representative in women's dormitories and sorority houses. The collection of magazines will be made in all women's residences and then taken to the health center by B and G.

Pledging for the sale of war stamps in the houses will also be started next week by dorm representatives. Each dorm will be assigned a quota for sales based on the number of purchasers.

Another CDC project will be the showing of films on defense and war activities at Ohio State university. The film will be shown to CDC workers and all interested.

### Infantry Pushes Beyond Sparanise to Isolate Nazis

Fifth Army Flank Held Up Along Canal North of Volturmo

ALLIED HDQ., ALGIERS, Oct. 29 (AP)—American and British troops, struggling up 1,600-foot slopes with fixed bayonets against massed German artillery, reached a position today to apply a powerful cut-off play against the mighty mountain fortress into which the enemy has converted Massico ridge on the southwestern end of the Italian front.

Lt. Gen. Mark W. Clark's American infantry, advancing through a driving rain, smashed three miles beyond Sparanise, and official reports from the front said they were threatening the road junction of Teano, from which a highway passes northward of lofty Massico ridge toward Rome, 94 miles away.

Five miles south of Teano other fifth army units already had seized Francolise, on a main highway that also stabs through the mountains just north of the Massico fortress. These two forces, by converging and pushing through the available pass, would isolate German troops on Massico, anchor of the entire Rommel defense line.

The fifth army's coastal flank still was held up by elaborate German defenses along the Regia canal, only four miles north of the Volturmo.

## Yank Submarines Smash 10 More Japanese Ships

WASHINGTON, Oct. 29 (AP)—American submarines cruising the Pacific have sunk 10 enemy vessels and damaged four others.

The figures, contained in a communique issued at Secretary Knox's press conference, brought to 475 the number of Japanese ships sunk, probably sunk or damaged.

Knox also announced that improvement in the submarine situation in the Atlantic has made it possible to discontinue plans for construction of 427 vessels which would have been used in anti-submarine work and to use the construction facilities thus released to build vessels for amphibious operations throughout the world.

The navy secretary also announced that with increasing activities in the Pacific it has been deemed advisable to improve repair facilities on the west coast. To free yards there for repair work, he said, construction of three cruisers, seven destroyers and nine fleet tugs had been transferred to east coast yards.

# Miners Must Accept Board Wage Ruling

Roosevelt Declares Work Stoppages Intolerable as 80,000 Strike

WASHINGTON, Oct. 29 (AP)—President Roosevelt, saying that a letdown of coal production is not to be tolerated, declared tonight that striking coal miners must accept the War Labor Board's wage decisions as final. "If they do not," he said, "I shall take decisive action to see that coal is mined."

While the number of striking miners went past the 80,000 mark, the United Mine workers high command arranged a meeting Monday on the WLB's decision which UMW President John L. Lewis has rejected. Roosevelt wrote Chairman W. H. Davis of the WLB: "Nation Short of Coal."

"We are short of coal to meet our war needs."

"We can no more tolerate the letting down of coal production than we can tolerate letting down the shipping of supplies to our fighting men."

Roosevelt said, however, he would not take "decisive action" until after the meeting of the war committee of the miners next Monday.

Strike spreads. The strike, meantime, spread rapidly. Some 52,700 of the 80,000 anthracite miners in Pennsylvania took their traditional day honoring John Mitchell, early union leader.

Some labor men were inclined to question when they might all back in view of dissatisfaction with the War Labor Board's decision on the anthracite wage scale.

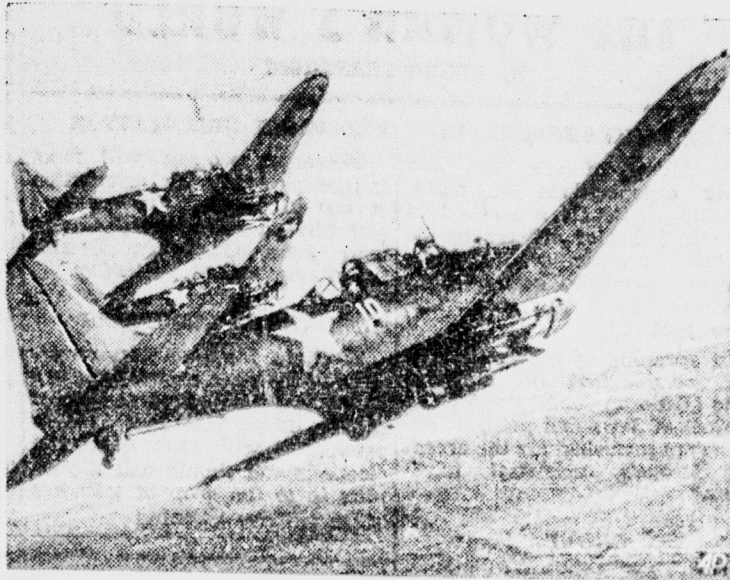
## Grecks Will Begin Informal Rushing

## 'All for Nothing at All' Makes Dem Hall Most Popular Clothier in Town

"We've got everything but love, soldier." That's what they sing out in the supply room in Demonstration Hall since the army moved in.

Under the supervision of T Sgt. Edward Savoie, cavalry non-com, with a 24 year service to his credit, the supply room furnishes approximately 2,200 men with everything they need in clothing, equipment and books. Some of the items in the clothing category include galoshes, jackets, long woolen underwear, boots, gloves, ties, socks, and shoestrings.

Equipment includes collar and sleeve insignia, chevrons, blank sacks, razor blades, towels and etc, canned meat, combs, haversacks, even tooth brushes.

Everything comes in all shapes, sizes but only one color. Shoes and overshoes range from size 6 to 15 and blouses range from a 32 chest measurement to a 50 inch measurement.

AST and aircrew test books, all college approved, also are issued as are surveying instruments, slide rules, mapmaking tools and song books.

In order to draw any of these items, Michigan State G. I. s, like Yanks all over the world, have to sign quartermaster forms on the date of issue.

And besides issuing everything the soldier needs, the government also repairs or salvages everything when it is sufficiently worn. Clothing has to be well torn before the supply room will take it in trade for a new article. However, shoes are sent to Fort Custer where a quarter-

master shoe repair shop reconstructs them.

In this way, the Dem hall supply room not only keeps G. I. s the sharpest crew on campus but upholds the old quartermaster slogan: "Meet the best dressed soldier in the world."

# Birdman Alights at State from 'Chute Outfit

At least one member of Michigan State's aircrew is able to get in the "extra 10 winks" in the morning—he saves time by leaping from the second story of Abbot hall to answer reveille. He is Staff Sgt. James W. Rankin of Alabama, who has made exhibition parachute jumps from low altitudes for many visiting dignitaries of the Allies.

Rankin also was a member of the first class to graduate from paratroop school at Fort Benning, Ga.

It was in Miami Beach that he jumped out of a second story window in response to his captain's order: "Get down here on the double!" He stepped back, took a running start and hit the ground in a somersault before the captain had a chance to close his eyes. When the dust had settled, Sergeant Rankin was standing in ranks at attention.

Keeping cool in emergencies is second nature by now to this 23 year-old student commander of Squadron "B." He's credited with over 16 official jumps, including a jump into a 30-mile gale which blew him miles off his intended landing spot. Dropping down at 100 feet a minute he saw a mountain stream directly beneath him. Slipping his chute, and making use of all of his jumping skills, he landed on the far side of the rapids.

Sergeant Rankin gave up a chance to go to OCS, on the basis of his performance in Louisiana maneuvers, and instead chose to earn his pilot's wings in the army air forces. "I won't be satisfied until I take up my own pursuit ship and start pouring lead," is the way he puts it.

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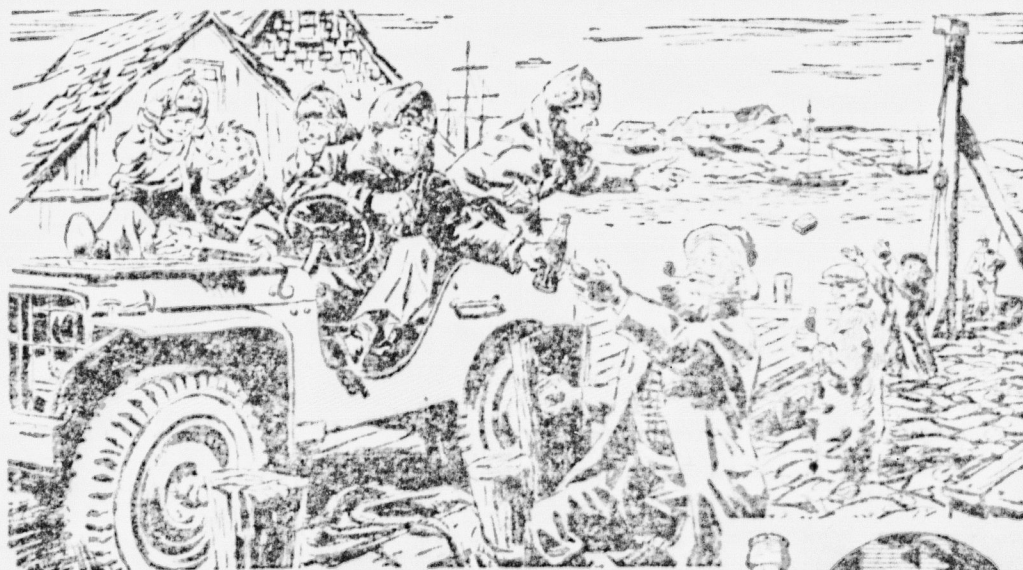

# Paratroops Land on Jap Island in Bougainville Area

Allies Attempt Mop-Up of Solomons

ALLIED HDQ. IN THE S. W. PACIFIC, Saturday, Oct. 30 (AP)—Allied paratroops have landed on Choiseul island, in the northern Solomons on the right flank of Japan's last big base of Bougainville.

The landings, accelerating an offensive to drive the Japanese out of all the Solomons, were achieved Thursday at Voza, Gen. Douglas MacArthur announced today.

This move speedily followed American and New Zealand landings Wednesday at dawn on the Treasury islands 30 miles south of Bougainville. The Japanese on the main island of Mono in that group now have been pushed to its northern end.

The landings on Choiseul occurred near the Japanese barge staging area. It was to Choiseul that many remnants of the Japanese troops driven out of the central Solomons were evacuated, with Bougainville their ultimate destination.

Choiseul is separated by Bougainville strait from Bougainville and its investment would control waters by which both southern Bougainville and the nearby Shortland islands are supplied.

Southern Bougainville's air bases already have been knocked out by American bombings and today's communiqué reported smashes at the Buka air base in the northern Bougainville sector. Seven Japanese planes were destroyed.

## Engineers to Sponsor Semi-formal Dance in Union Ballroom

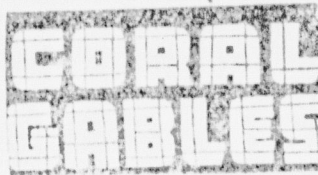
Civilians and former junior ROTC Engineers will sponsor a semi-formal dance in the Union ballroom from 9 to 12 p. m. one week from tonight.
