## Russians Capture Rail Junction. Split German Forces in Northern Ukraine

LONDON, Nov. 18 (AP)—The Red army split the German forces in White Russia and the northern Ukraine today by capturing the important rail junction of Korosten. They also narrowed the enemy's escape corridor from imperilled Gomel to less than 25 miles by toppling the protective stronghold of Rezhitsa after a furious three-day battle.

Two orders of the day by Marshal Premier Joseph Stalin announced the twin victories below and above the Pripiet marshes. They were broadcast by Moscow and repeated by the Soviet monitor.

The last north-south railway available to the Germans, the Dnieper-Donets railway 60 miles west of the pre-war Polish border, was cut at Korosten late yesterday after a two-day struggle by Gen. Nikolai Vatutin's forces, which already had split the enemy's forces in the southern and northern Ukraine by capturing Zhitomir, 45 miles below Korosten.

Reversing from Wednesday's retreat in the Zhitomir sector, the Russians also beat off a heavy German counter-attack.

PEARL HARBOR, T. H., Nov. 18 (AP)—The central Pacific aerial offensive was extended into its fourth and fifth successive days when army Liberator bombers raided the Jaluit island airbase in the Marshall Islands Tuesday and Tarawa airfield, in the Gilberts, the following day, it was announced at naval headquarters today.

### Turkey Prepares for Allied Arrival. German Attack

ANKARA, Turkey, Nov. 17 (Delayed), (AP)—Turkey is giving sub rosa assistance to the Allied armed forces which closely approximates that which the United States gave Britain in the months before Pearl Harbor, and is moving toward war with the Germans.

Continued Turkish aid to the Allies might lead to a token attack by the Nazis on Turkish soil and bring the whole gathering storm into the open.

Turkey already has developed elaborate airports and landing fields which hardly need more than the arrival of Allied bombing planes and their crews to be transformed into bases for far-reaching operations against Axis-held territory.

The new Turkish position stems from the Moscow conference and subsequent talks in Cairo between Turkish foreign Minister Nuran Menemencioğlu and British Foreign Secretary Anthony Eden.

### U.S. Bombers Smash Nazi Repair Depot

#### Planes Attack Largest Norwegian Base During Sub-Zero Weather

LONDON, Nov. 18 (AP) American Liberators, winging unescorted across the North sea in below zero weather for the second time in three days, today smashed the Germans' biggest Norwegian airplane repair and maintenance depot at Kjeller, outside Oslo.

The precision attack was designed to eliminate a vital component of the Nazi air machine. Nine bombers lost.

Nine of the heavy bombers failed to complete the arduous 1,200 mile round trip, but Sweden announced that three had landed on her neutral soil, with crews unharmed.

Returning fliers reported that the long row of buildings comprising the repair depot only 11 miles northeast of the Norwegian capital erupted in giant explosions.

The bomber gunners shot down eight German fighters.

Spreads Air Power to Greece. The daylight British-based operation spread the weight of Allied air power in the short space of 12 hours across more than 1,000 miles of enemy territory, from the cold Scandinavian fjords to Greece.

Last night, the RAF sent cascades of high explosives down on the German inland port of Ludwigshafen, the site of the world's largest chemical works, while Mosquitos, for the third time in a week, hit Berlin and — See BOMBERS—Page 4

### American Naval Fleet Shells Nippon Bases Near Bougainville

ADM. WILLIAM F. HALSEY'S SOUTH PACIFIC HDQ., Nov. 19, (AP)—For the second time since the invasion of the northern Solomons opened, an American naval task force has moved through the entire length of the island of Bougainville to bombard Japanese air bases on Buka, it was announced today.

For 45 minutes the ships shelled the Buka airbase area on Wednesday.

Japanese float planes and torpedo planes tried to hit the ships during the trip up the coast but they sustained no damage, Admiral Halsey's headquarters said.

## Nursing Course Offers Two-fold Education

Enrolled at Michigan State in either Liberal Arts division or the Applied Science division are between 12 and 15 women who are aiming at more than the average college student. They are the five-year nurses.

Combining their college education of nine terms at State with the study of clinical nursing practice in the various departments of Edward W. Sparrow hospital in Lansing, the prospective nursing graduates find their work more than a course of study.

### Take Home Ec Courses

At State, the women take regular Home Economics courses, specializing in foods and nutrition, and home management.

Their work in sciences is gained through college departments, and supplemented at the Sparrow school of nursing.

Under the advisership of Miss Jean Hawks, professor of foods and nutrition, the three seniors and their undergraduate associates pursue their studies at State as any student does. But when their work, during the second and third years of their curriculum takes them to the Lansing hospital, it becomes extremely specialized.

### Three to Graduate

General medical and surgical study, operating rooms, diet kitchens, and obstetrical and pediatric departments are some of the branches the student nurses explore.

### Lecturer Relates War Experiences

With all the good reportorial writing which is coming out of the war at present, Edward Weeks, editor of the Atlantic Monthly, who spoke last night in College auditorium, does not believe that there will be as many war books after this war as there were after the last one.

In discussing "Books in a Troubled World" Weeks reviewed, criticized, and gave a resume of such books as "So Little Time" and "Burma Surgeon."

He also named sources for future novels such as the women in heavy industry, navy stories which cannot be told yet, and the ship exchange in England.

Weeks told the audience of approximately 2,000 persons about his airplane trip to England last summer about losing a German propaganda picture magazine to the censors and people like John Masefield, whom he went to see while in London.

He also related his 48 hours at an airfield, detailing the planes, crews, the takeoff and return of 26 crews of RAF and American eighth bomber command in a raid over Germany.

In a brief interview after his lecture, Weeks said that women in journalism would probably be able to keep the place they are now establishing for themselves.

**G**OING through final week this term will be like running the obstacle course with full pack and a bad hangover. The hangover will be the strain of studying and the full pack will be the burden of going to classes all final week in addition to exams.

Spartans are certainly in for a double dose the week of Dec. 13 because of the new exam system.

First put into operation this summer, the new system does not set aside a special exam week. Students keep on going to classes in their regular schedules taking their exams the last class periods.

For example a class which meets Monday, Wednesday and Friday will have the exam either Wednesday or Friday of the last week at the discretion of the instructor and it may either be one hour or two hours.

If the final is two hours it is given in the last two periods and if it is only one hour it may be given in either of the last two class periods.

A class which meets Tuesday, Thursday and Saturday will have the exam Tuesday or Thursday since vacation begins Friday noon.

Under this set-up final exams are reduced to the level of midterms since the student has to keep on going to classes and handing in assignments while preparing for his exams.

Finals are difficult enough for the student without having the additional strain of going to classes all the time. The new plan also makes for a heavy concentration of tests in one day.

Most students will not finish exams until noon Friday and therefore everyone will be "getting out of town" at the same time. Under the former program the exodus was staggered because all students did not finish at the same time.

The plan was originated since the usual two-hour period interfered with army classroom schedules. That part is logical.

But most instructors in summer session gave only one hour finals and if the instructors continue in this way a regular schedule could be maintained.

However, it is still possible to have exams given at the last two class periods if the instructor requires two hour exams and still not have regular class meetings during exam week.

**S**TATE students are getting a much better break than a good many other college students when it comes to Christmas vacations. It is rumored that Purdue will not have any Christmas vacation and regular students will continue classes just as military units on campus are.

Several other schools are adjourning Dec. 23 and resuming classes Dec. 29.

## AST Units to Parade Before Fifth Weekly Game

Concluding five weeks of campus league football, tomorrow's game will feature a meeting between the Vets and the civilians in the first half of the dual event, with the on-campus and off-campus Engineers battling in the second.

Preceding the game will be the AST military parade, and the season's final wind-up will take place Monday when the coaches of the five teams will be feted at a dinner in the Union ballroom.

John A. Hannah, Sec. of the ROTC, and deans of the five divisions will review the parade, which is the third to have been held in Macklin Hall. The parade will start at 10:30 a. m. and will be immediately followed by the games.

Miss Virginia said that pins, necklaces, bracelets and other trinkets will be accepted.


# Americans, Aussies Make Major Gains in South Pacific

# Sangro River Front Blasted by Artillery

### Fortresses, Mitchells Score on Airdromes in Athens Sector

ALLIED HDQ., ALGIERS, Nov. 18 (AP)—German preparations for a counterattack along the middle sector of the Sangro river front were smashed yesterday by the concentrated fire of eighth army artillery, while continued heavy rains converted many rivers and creeks along the Italian battle line into raging torrents.

Diverted from Italian targets by the unfavorable weather, American Flying Fortresses and 325 Mitchells again turned their wrath against important enemy airdromes in the Athens area in a continuing effort to curb German air power.

The unescorted Fortresses flew through a heavy barrage to drop bombs on hangars, storage dumps, runways and parked aircraft at Eleusis field, leaving lowering columns of smoke behind them.

The Mitchells and their Lightning escort sprayed Kalamaki airdrome with bombs and bullets and left eight fires burning.

The only important ground action along the rain-soaked and cold Italian front came east of the Sangro river in the vicinity of the villages of Archi and Persano, which are a mile apart and three miles northwest of Atezza.
