

CIO, GM Strike Rests On Steel Settlement

Wage Issue Remains Deadlocked **As Parties Discuss Minor Points**

DETROIT, Feb. 6 (AP) — Special federal mediator James F. Dewey today expressed the opinion that the "steel strike must be settled before the General Motors strike can be settled."

Dewey's statements came after another two-hour session between representatives of the CIO United Auto Workers and the strikebound GM corporation, whose production lines have been idled 78 days by a strike of 175,000 production workers.

The meeting, which Dewey said "brought the parties closer to agreement" on minor contract points, was held in the absence
