Council Tells Election Rules At Meeting

Ignorance of campaign rules will be accepted as an excuse for freshman and sophomore candidates who violated these rules, but only this once, Bud Smith, Dearborn senior, announced at Student council meet last night.

Smith read the following rules set up in January, 1944:

"All campaign literature shall be limited to mimeographed material. Each mimeographed sheet should have the signature or signatures of those who prepare the same.

No Marking Buildings

a. There shall not be any defacing or otherwise defacing of public or private property by the candidate, individuals, or organization in student elections. To scatter material promiscuously over the campus or in the town in such a way as to make a litter of trash is strongly discouraged.

b. Each candidate is requested to provide a copy of all mimeographed advertising materials for Student council inspection and filing by election day.

No Electioneering Permitted

c. None of the means of advertising listed in article I, nor written material, nor electioneering shall be allowed on the day of elections in the buildings in which the elections are held, within one hundred (100) feet of the polls, with the exception of one eight and one-half by eleven inch poster, upon which may be posted a picture of the candidate not to exceed three by five inches in measurement. (NOTE: This requirement has been waived to read nine by 12 inches at the most.) Such posters are to be placed upon a bulletin board designed by the council for said purpose.

d. No individual or organization may use the name of any candidate in any of the means of advertising stated above without the knowledge and consent of the candidate.

e. All disqualifications and infractions of election rules must be published in the State News by the Student council."

Petitioning Permitted

Additional names on the two class slates, Smith said, are allowed to be added before primary, and have been, when a petition containing names from five per cent of the voting class is turned in to the council.

\$12,000,000 To Go To State, U. of M.; Mental Hospitals

LANSING, Feb. 13 (AP) — Opposition to the administration's financial program from the so-called city aid bloc evaporated in the Senate today as that chamber passed unanimously \$12,000,000 worth of building appropriations for the University of Michigan, Michigan State college and the state mental hospitals.

Planned as a test of opposition in the Senate, the bills evaded even adverse debate.

House Disagrees

However, the House, which had passed the measures previously in a similar move to get a head start on the city-aid lobby, balked at a Senate decision to leave the allocation of the funds to each institution in the hands of the state administrative board.

Clinging to its proposal to leave that power in a special board including administrative board members and legislators, the House headed the bills for a conference committee to iron out the differences.

The building bills provide \$3,300,000 for the University of Michigan, \$3,000,000 for Michigan State college and \$5,700,000 for the mental hospitals.

School Aid Bill

The school aid bill, providing an additional \$3,200,000 for public schools in each year of the biennium, likewise was passed in the Senate and returned to the House for concurrence in an amendment which specifies that the money must go for salaries of school employees.

Senator Harry F. Hittle, Lansing, Republican, softened his demand of yesterday that it be allocated on a per-employee basis after asserting he found such a plan was unfeasible. The money will be allocated according to the usual formula.

State to Provide Guidance Center

Paul Dressel, counseling director, has announced that a new program to provide counseling service and aptitude tests for World War II veterans has been initiated.

The contract signed with the Veteran administration provides that any veteran authorized by a training officer will report to one of the staff of three counselors at the guidance center which is being set up in Demonstration hall for a conference. When his record has been carefully considered, he will be given a series of tests from two to six hours long.

When the results of the tests have been recorded, the counselor will make recommendations to help the veteran ascertain what he is best fitted for vocationally or scholastically. The veteran will then report to the training officer for assignment.

News in Brief

DETROIT, Feb. 13 (AP)—Special federal labor mediator James F. Dewey today pressed his efforts to end the 85-day-old General Motors strike while the National Labor Relations board prepared for a Thursday resumption of its inquiry into bargaining between GM and the CIO United Auto Workers.

JACKSON, Feb. 13 (AP)—Judge John Simpson today took under advisement motions for a directed verdict of acquittal for Frank D. McKay, Grand Rapids politician, and his four co-defendants accused of conspiring to corrupt the state liquor law between 1938 and 1940.

The judge said he would rule on this, and other defense motions to strike parts of testimony of defense witnesses, beginning at 9:30 Thursday morning. He refused to say in what order he would rule on the motions.

LONDON, Feb. 13 (AP)—The United Nations security council tonight ejected a Soviet Ukrainian request for a five-power commission to investigate conditions in the Netherlands East Indies there.

Erring Students Will Pay Fines For Violations Of Auto Rules

The following rules and regulations governing the use of cars by State students is appearing for the second time. It will be printed in Saturday's paper. This is to insure that all students have the opportunity to become familiar with them.

In general no student in attendance at Michigan State college shall operate any motor vehicle.

Permits are issued at the discretion of the Chief of Police and Dean of Students for commuters, married students, those taking six credits or less, for business purposes, those with health or physical handicaps, graduate assistants, and emergency driving.

Married students and East Lansing residents are to drive for family reasons only.

All students are subject to check by the police for violations of driving for social purposes night and day.

Parking lots next to the campus buildings are for faculty members; also for the health group when so designated on their permit.

Certain areas are subject to fines for violating the uniform rules of general public safety: yellow lines, no parking areas on boulevard west of Union building, parking wrong way, cross walks, loading dock entrances, building entrances, fire hydrants, overnight parking around the campus dormitories, (cars from these areas should

be in the parking lots after 10 p.m.)

A speed limit of 20 miles per hour will be enforced at all times.

Fines for violations are given according to the following schedule:

First offense—\$2.00 Second offense—\$5.00 Third offense—\$10.00

Unregistered cars will receive a first fine of \$5.00.

Any driver who receives a summons ticket for a violation must report to the Office of the Dean of Students according to the notice of time limit on the summons.

All collections for fines are allocated to the student loan fund.

In the near future special metal tags will be issued to all students having permits. These tags must be attached to the rear license plate.

Max Morris To Lead Ten Basketeers Tally-Making Race

CHICAGO Feb. 12 (AP)—Deacon Max Morris, Western University's one-man band, today was in hot pursuit of the Big Ten basketball title with a nine-game record of 147 points.

Morris, who grabbed the 1945 title with a 12-game bag of 189 points, last week amassed 49 points in two games.

Morris' league statistics today show he held a nine-point lead over Bob Doster, brilliant freshman who has scored 100 points in nine games.

Morris topped the 56 field goal and 15 free throws for a total average of 16.3 points per game.

The husky Wildcat star still is a battle on his hands. Doster, who is Wisconsin with points and Minnesota's Tony Danowski with a 13.3 average in 10 games, can overhaul Morris.

Western has averaged 63 points in its last three games, an average of 53.5 points, a mark behind the top average of 64 points shared by Minnesota and seventh-place Michigan.

In view of the Buckeye's recent triumph over Purdue, defending Big Ten champion and conqueror of the Spartans once this season, what might have been considered an easy meet has taken on a hue of complexity.

Collinsons are working hard in preparation for the invasion of the Buckeyes. In recent workouts challenge matches have been held in the 165 and 175 pound classes.

Burl Boring, back after a sick leave, defeated the up and coming John Dowell, Tulsa red-head, for the right to wrestle at 165 pounds. Dowell in turn challenged and defeated Jerry Brendo for current supremacy in the 175 pound class.

Gordon Cole may not be in condition to challenge Bill Moxey for the 136 pound slot on the team. Cole, a victim of flu, has just returned to the campus after a week's illness and may not be sufficiently recovered by Saturday.

Shirley Fletcher and Bill Coney can have the 121 and 126 pound slots handed down as does Bob Madsen in the heavy weight class.

The veteran Iggy Konrad is expected to carry the battle to Ohio State in the 145 pound class. A catch to start with is Gale Mikes, 1945 AAMU champ. Mikes has been winner in all his bouts the last two years.

Haley Sets Pace In Abbot Hall Bowling

State's Ecuadorian Star

Breaking Freestyle Records Is Old Habit Of Abel Gilbert

Michigan State college swimmers are proud of their little freestyler Abel Gilbert from Ecuador. Not only has he helped bring the Spartans out of a swimming depression into a nationally recognized team, but he has been one of the outstanding individual scorers in the mid-west.

Coming to the Spartan squad in time for the first meet of the season, the Ecuadorian is recognized as an artist in the 220-yard freestyle event. Gilbert swam in two events during the opening meet with Northwestern for his first tussle with college competition.

After winning the 100-yard sprint in 55 seconds, only a half-second off the MSC varsity record, and placing second in the 200-yard freestyle event, there was little doubt among qualified observers that Gilbert is the man to watch this season.

Fastest Freestyler

"We've got a prospective national champion here," Coach Charles McCaffree, Spartan coach, remarked later. "He's going to be the fastest freestyler we've ever had at Michigan State."

And that's just what Gilbert is rapidly turning out to be. In the meet with Illinois he broke the old 220 record set by State's Bob Allwardt in the fall of 1942. Allwardt's time was 2:21.5 and Gilbert brought it down to 2:11.5. Against Purdue he swam it in 2:04.1 and two weeks ago he defeated Michigan's famed

Matt Mann III, registering a new record of 2:14.3.

Holds Ecuadorian Records

Gilbert, who holds national records in Ecuador in the 100 meter, 200 meter, and 400 meter freestyle events, has rhythm and perfect coordination which enables him to swim long distances and still come out of the pool fresh.

Gilbert, five feet three inches, 24 years, came to this country in 1939 and enrolled in the Mercersburg, Pa., academy on an athletic scholarship and swam with the squad for four years.

He learned to speak English during the first year and graduated in 1944. He was at Penn State for a short time, then went home to Ecuador before enrolling in State's agricultural college.

His ambition is to return to Ecuador after graduation, be a good livestock farmer, and "make a lot of money."

President of Mississippi State college, the Spartan team foe for October 12, is Dr. Fred T. Mitchell, who directed the service men's institute and was counselor for men at MSC until last fall.

Ickes Resigns Cabinet Post

Truman Names Chapman As Temporary Head

WASHINGTON, Feb. 13 (AP)—In a political explosion which may reverberate into the 1948 campaign, Secretary of the Interior Harold L. Ickes resigned today declaring that he would not "commit perjury for the sake of a party."

The 71-year old New Dealer, original member of the Roosevelt cabinet, accused President Truman of impropriety in passing "judgment on a question of veracity" between Ickes and Edwin M. Pauley, Mr. Truman's nominee for undersecretary of the navy.

'Rawest' Offer

Ickes had told the Senate naval committee that Pauley made him the "rawest proposition" he ever received—an offer to raise \$300,000 in campaign contributions from oil men if the government would drop a suit for title to submerged offshore oil lands. Pauley denied the charge and President Truman said Ickes could have been mistaken.

Ickes resigned in a 3,000 word letter to the White House, and elaborated on his reasons in an extraordinary news conference attended by 300 reporters.

He said the President asked him on Feb. 5, after the first of Ickes' two appearances before the Senate naval committee, to tell the truth but "be as gentle as you can about Ed Pauley."

Resignation Accepted

The White House made an oral announcement of Ickes' resignation an hour before the secretary's news conference. It merely said the President had accepted the resignation, received yesterday, as of this coming Friday. Ickes had suggested March 31 as the effective date.

The President named Oscar L. Chapman, of Denver, Colo., assistant secretary since May, 1933, as acting interior secretary pending permanent appointment.
