A rough-riding and high scoring Notre Dame quintet defeated Michigan State college cagers 56-54 last hight in Jenison fieldhouse, before a record attendance of 10,085 spectators.

Starting out in great style by holding a 28-27 lead at halft me, the Spartans fell behind in the second period with six minutes left to play and were never able to overtake the Irish.

State took a barrage of shots in the final minutes with a pair by Don Waldron and Sam Fortino nitting the mark and putting the Spartans within two points of the visitors, but this was as close as the Spartans could get.
