Governments Want Franco Overthrown

WASHINGTON, Feb. 27 (AP)—Reliable diplomatic officials said tonight the British and French governments have "approved in principle" a U. S. proposal for a joint declaration designed to encourage the Spanish people to overthrow Generalissimo Franco.

The officials, who may not be identified, said they expect the text of the U. S. proposal to be issued simultaneously in Washington, London and Paris later this week after some minor revisions have been made.

Hours after the news had "leaked" from London, the State department today acknowledged that the United States had made new proposals on Spain to Britain and France.

The department refused to disclose the proposals. However, diplomats said they understood the proposed declaration would include:

1. A new denunciation of Franco, deploring the continued existence of his regime.
2. A statement that the three governments would recognize a broadly-representative interim regime in Spain if Franco were ousted.
3. A reiteration that the three countries would not meddle in Spain's domestic affairs, and that any change would have to come from the Spanish people.

These informants understood that the communication did not approve any breaking of economic ties with Spain or complete withdrawal of diplomatic recognition.

DETROIT, Feb. 27 (AP)—Detroit's milk strike—which has cut off 60 per cent of the city's supply—ended its first week today with dealers standing firm in their contention that any wage increases to dairymen must be tied in with OPA price relief.

WASHINGTON, Feb. 27 (AP)—Senator Arthur H. Vandenberg declared today that America's foreign policy must be as frank and firm as Russia's to meet a "desperate need for mutual understanding."

Permanent peace and the future of the United Nations are at stake, the Michigan Republican said.

BOMBAY, Feb. 27 (AP)—A telephoned report of Nagpur in central India said 2,500 Indian troops had revolted today at Jubulpore, 50 miles northeast of Bombay, marching out of their barracks, and that revolvers and bayonets had been used in attempts to stop them.

WASHINGTON, Feb. 27 (AP)—Over President Truman's opposition, House Republicans opened a drive today to sidetrack universal military training in favor of an effort to bring about an international ban on conscription.

Grave Doubt
That this fundamental inertia can be overcome Leonhardt expressed a grave doubt. Only the academic youth, he said, can supply the needed impetus; if it can divert some of the energy expended at football games to the betterment of government, changes will be quick to appear.

And the first change, he concluded, must be a thorough "streamlining" of American government.

State To Offer Advanced ROTC For Veterans

The military department at Michigan State will offer a course in advanced ROTC spring term, according to Lt. Col. Gerald Peterson.

The age limit has been extended, and all veterans on campus between 19 and 27 years of age are eligible to take advantage of the opportunity to earn a commission in the reserve army.

Those who enroll in the course will receive three academic credits for five hours of classes per week. All text books, in addition to complete officer's uniform, will be furnished. A monthly wage equivalent to the garrison ration will be paid.

All veterans who are interested are asked to contact Col. Peterson at the military department in Demonstration hall before March 8.

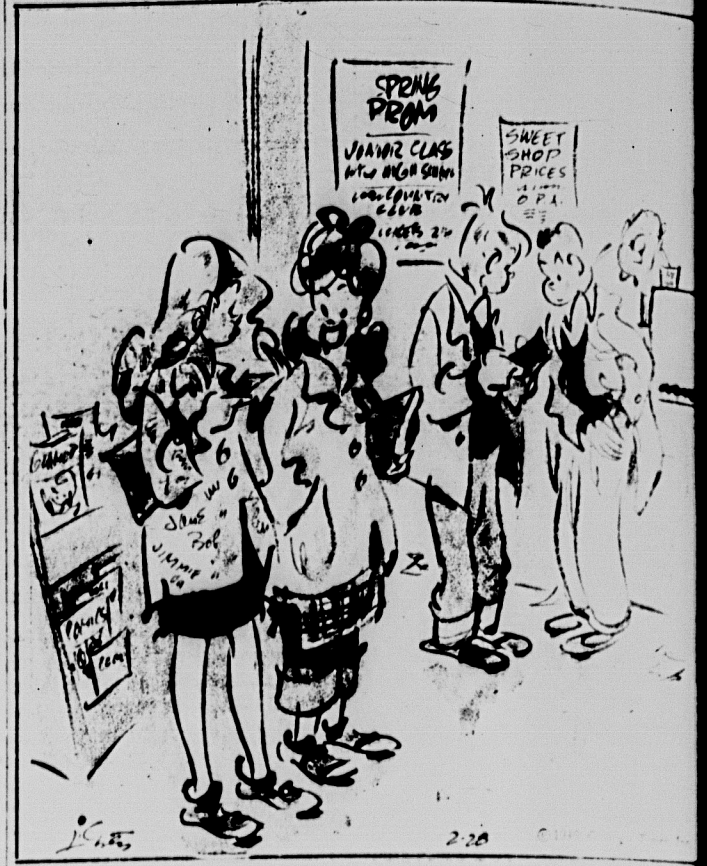

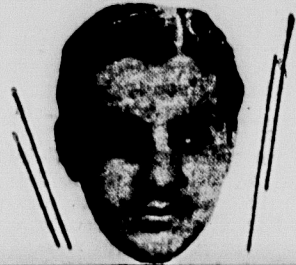
The subject for the program Saturday night will be a split design pertaining to the discoloration in varieties of potatoes. E. J. Wheeler will be the speaker.

ANNOUNCEMENT that the National Collegiate athletic association basketball tournament will be played in Madison Square Garden March 26, 28 and 30, leaves Michigan State in a very desirable position should the Spartans beat Wisconsin tomorrow and receive the invitation.

Among mid-western collegiate teams there are few clubs rated higher than State, Notre Dame, Indiana, and Iowa are probably the only ones that cage sports pick above the Spartans. The Irish are certainly no better than one or two points in the minds of many.

Out Two Bids
The usual custom in sending bids for the NCAA is to label one as "bid one" and the other as "bid two." Notre Dame is sure to rate the first one because of its excellent season and the other — well, it is a good question.

Due to the fact that the Big Ten will not permit its teams to compete in such post-season affairs, it is unlikely that Illinois, Iowa, or Ohio State, the eastern conference leading clubs, will be asked, although sometimes this is done as a formality.

For-Seven
The Spartans should knock Wisconsin once more it would be their five victories out of seven starts against Western conference clubs, including a one-point win over the newly-crowned Buckeye quintet.

This record, along with the fact that State has made this year, in its style of fast-break play, the Spartans in good stead in the powers-that-be who want a team to compete in the Madison Square Garden affair.

School At Time of Tourney
Since the college will be on vacation at the time of the NCAA, would be the ideal time for entrance into a hardwood tourney. You can be sure the Spartan team will have this in mind when they take the floor against the Badgers tomorrow.

It has been a long season for the yellow, but a chance to play in the Garden in one of the nation's biggest basketball extravaganzas would make the hoopsters eager and fresh as if the season were just beginning.

Bob Malaga, Cleveland freshman has earned Roger Cessna and Wally Phillips on the entry list of the Michigan Indoor Open championships to be played on the arena's high floor March 2-4 and 9-10. This gives Michigan three representatives in the tourney's starting field of 16.

U. of M. Thinclads Favored In Meet

There is little chance the Spartan cindermen will be able to upset the powerful Michigan track team Saturday in Ann Arbor, but Coach Karl Schlademan is looking for enough points to outdo Notre Dame and in so doing take a second in the triangular meet.

The Notre Dame team, which has always been strong in the distances, will be a big threat in the mile and two mile. The Irish ace, miler Bill Leonard, will be the heavy favorite when he meets Spartan Walt Kalmbach, and Bob and Ross Hume, U. of M. conference title holders.

Leonard recently ran in the famous Wanamaker mile, part of the Melrose games held in Madison Square Gardens, and at that time made a very favorable impression, taking a third behind Les MacMitchell, the country's number one distance man.

U. of M.'s Charles Bidsall, present Western conference two-mile champ, should be a slight favorite when he goes to the post with Spartan Walter Mack and Jim Kelly and Joe Murphy of Notre Dame.

LAKELAND, Fla., Feb. 27 (P)—Hank Greenberg got hold of his timing in the Detroit Tigers' spring camp today, belting two straight pitches over the 350-foot left field hall as the world champions took an hour's batting practice in a steady rain.

Hank's two straight homers were off Frank (Stubby) Overmire, tiny lefthander. Later he lifted a third drive over the wall off Paul (Dizzy) Trout, who was pitching to the batters for the fifth time in a week.

Hal White and Tommy Bridges also pitched to the hitters while Jimmy Outlaw, arriving simultaneously with a late shipment of uniforms from Detroit, worked out at third base.

Manager Steve O'Neill, calling off this afternoon's rookie drill because of the rain, announced that Freddie Hutchinson, Al Benton and Virgil (Fire) Trucks would take three-inning turns tomorrow, pitching for the "rookies" in Detroit's first intra-squad game. Art Houtteman, Denny Horton, and Norman Scott, all righthanders, were the pitching choices for the "regulars."

O'Neill named himself manager of one team and Coach Frank Shellenback of the other. Groundskeeper Neal Conway was slated to umpire.

State Out For Second Win Over Badger Five Friday

The Michigan State college quintet that meets Wisconsin in Jenison fieldhouse tomorrow night at 8 will be out for its second victory over the Badgers and fifth win in Big Ten competition.

Coach Ben Van Alstyne is planning on using all 15 men of the squad for the tussle in order to give every man a chance to finish up the season with some action.

Regular Five To Start

No injuries were reported among the starting five, and if things go according to schedule Sam Fortino and Robin Roberts will be in at forwards. Shorty Krall will handle the pivot position with Don Waldron and Ollie White at guards.

Fortino will be out to increase his seasonal record now standing at 240 points. Joe Gerard, Spartan star of the 1941 quintet, previously held the Michigan State individual scoring record at 239 markers. Fortino's 23 points against Wisconsin last Saturday night put him one point over Gerard's mark.

State's reputation for playing fast ball has been met with high praise from both fans and sports writers. The sellout at Jenison fieldhouse of over 10,000 fans when Notre Dame played, clearly showed that the Spartans play the type of basketball the people like to see.

Always considered a potential threat to its foes, State's squad has been beaten twice by only three teams. A rough schedule along with a pack of high-powered teams that rank as the best in the country has been the type of season Coach Van Alstyne and charges have gone through.

At present State stands with 11 victories and nine losses, with six of the defeats going to three of the best squads in the country—Notre Dame, Kentucky, and Great Lakes.

Matched against Ris will be the Spartan speedster, Abel Gilbert, who dropped his first decision in the 220 when the McCaffreemen were dunked by Ohio State last week.

In basketball Joe Gerard, bouncing "Rubber Ball" of the 1942 team, holds two individual Spartan scoring records, having scored 239 points for a single season and 448 tallies for three seasons.

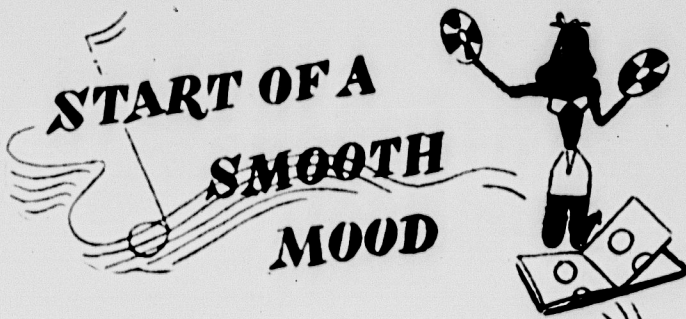
