Linton Reveals Averages

All-College Grades Climb Above Fall Term Level

Spartan marks for winter term combined for a total 1.44 all college average, Robert L. Linton, college registrar, revealed yesterday. Fall term figures showed a total average of 1.31.

Ex-servicemen displayed great zeal in their studies compiling a 1.45 sum as compared to the non-veterans with an average of 1.32. Ex-servicewomen followed suit with a 1.59 in comparison to the non-veteran women's total of 1.47.

Women on campus held the scholastic edge on the men with a 1.47. The Spartan men turned out 1.40 total.

Fraternities and sororities combined to register an all society average of 1.53 whereas independent men and women chalked up a 1.41 total.

The school of science and arts topped divisional averages with a 1.55. Following in order of achievement were: veterinary, 1.50; agriculture, 1.44; home economics, 1.37; business & public service, 1.32; and basic college, 1.23.

Seniors led class totals with a 1.82 average followed by the junior class with 1.63. Sophomores amassed a total of 1.46 while freshmen produced a 1.25 average.

A story was behind this innocent-looking advertisement buried in the State News classified section recently. Investigation revealed that the doctor-advertiser is Dr. Clyde F. Cairy, associate professor of veterinary physiology and spare time magician, and that the skunk in question is an important cog in Cairy's magic routine.

It is not to be presumed, however, that the animal is the whole act. Rather a shy skunk, he is produced from some unsuspecting person's shirt front or coat pocket, only to be banished into limbo a moment later. Leading the list in fraternity scholastic achievement for winter term was Alpha Gamma Rho with an average of 1.58, Robert S. Linton, college registrar, has announced. The Greek men took a back seat to the sororities' term average of 1.67, compiling a total of 1.40.

Showing remarkable improvement over fall term's efforts, Psi Upsilon ran a close second with 1.57. Third place honors went to Sigma Chi and FarmHouse both with 1.49.

The remainder of the fraternity averages are as follows, Alpha Tau Omega and Phi Kappa Tau, 1.45; Alpha Epsilon Pi, 1.44; Phi Delta Theta, 1.41; Sigma Alpha Epsilon, 1.40; Sigma Nu, 1.38; Pi Kappa Phi, 1.34; Theta Chi, 1.30; Lambda Chi Alpha, 1.28; Kappa Sigma, 1.22; Delta Chi, 1.19; and Delta Sigma Phi, 1.16.

The fraternity ratings include the marks of active members only.

Freshmen Teams Win Second Place In State Debate

Three of six debates were won in Ypsilanti Friday by the freshman debate team, placing it second in the State tournament for inexperienced debaters, according to Coach Gordon Thomas.

Discussions dealt with "Resolved: Policy of the United States should be directed toward the establishment of free trade among nations of the world," he continued.

House OKs Draft Holiday, Increases Privates Pay

WASHINGTON, April 15 (AP) — The House voted a five-month draft "holiday" today and a 50 per cent pay increase for buck privates.

The actions contrasted with appeals of the administration and the services for continuation of inductions for one year and a 20 per cent pay boost for all servicemen.

Separate bills the House sent to the Senate are designed, taken together, to meet the manpower needs of the armed forces by voluntary enlistments during a trial period between May 15 and October 15 in which actual inductions would be prohibited.

One extends the draft law from May 15 of this year to Feb. 15, 1947, with these restrictions:

1. No inductions of anyone between May 15 and Oct. 15.
2. No inductions of teenagers at any time (the present law permits the drafting of 18 and 19-year olds).
3. No inductions of fathers.
4. A limit of 18 months on the service of any inductee, regardless of when he was drafted.
5. Restoration of the draft after Oct. 15 and until Feb. 15 by presidential order if the president finds that voluntary enlistments are inadequate to meet these strengths as of July 1, 1947: army, 1,070,000; navy, 352,000; marine corps, 198,000.

No Vacations For Vets, VA Decides

Veterans attending school under Public Act 16 who interrupt training of their own volition may lose eligibility under P. L. 16 unless the interruption is for such valid reason as: 1. health, 2. inability to obtain a full course load in their particular field of endeavor, or 3. any other reason classified as valid by the Veterans administration.

Interruption during the summer for vacation or employment is not considered a valid reason. Proof of validity rests upon the veteran and must be presented to the local office of the U. S. Veterans administration in demonstration hall, John W. Hall representation of the Veterans administration on campus, said yesterday.

Previous instructions permitted re-entrance even though pension had been received. Now, however, if the pensionable rating is lost through physical examination during a period of voluntary interruption in training, educational benefits under Public Act 16 are forfeited. This is in accordance with recent instructions from the Veterans administration Central Office, Washington, D. C.

Hamilton Names Judges

Department Reveals Arbiters for Contest; Groups Include Poetry, Short Story, Essay

Names of several of the judges of the annual MSC creative writing contest have been announced by Prof. C. C. Hamilton of the English department and chairman of the contest committee. The contests include the short story contest, poetry contest, Lawson essay contest, and the essay contest for undergraduate women.

Dr. Marvin T. Herrick, professor of English at the University of Illinois, has been chosen as one of the essay judges. He is a writer of stories and essays.

Verse Judges Chosen

Two of the poetry judges are Prof. Leo Kirschbaum of the English department at St. Louis university, and Macha L. Rosenthal. Professor Kirschbaum is a poet and a scholar of the renaissance period. He is also a past winner of the Hopwood poetry contest sponsored annually by the University of Michigan. Rosenthal, also a writer in verse, is a faculty member at MSC who was granted a leave of absence to study at New York university.

Other judges will include editors of well-known short story magazines. Their names will be announced later.

April Deadline Set

Hamilton reminded students that all manuscripts must be in the office of the English department, room 202, Morrill hall, on or before April 29, 1946. The contests are open to any undergraduate student of MSC. Copies of the rules may be obtained in

the English department office.

Prizes for the short story contest are: first, \$30; second, \$20 third, \$10. Poetry contest awards are \$15 for the first place, \$10 or second, and \$5 for third. The Lawson essay contest winner will receive \$25, while \$15 will be presented to the writer of the best essay in the essay contest for undergraduate women.

Members of Faculty To Help in Revision Of Garden Monthly

Members of the Michigan State college horticulture and entomology department are aiding in the revision of "Michigan Gardner," monthly publication on amateur gardening published by the Michigan Horticultural society in Detroit.

book of card tricks from a mail order house.

Card Tricks Remain

Since then his repertoire has expanded to more than 100 varied illusions and slight-of-hand tricks. Included in these are several of those original card tricks which have survived the ravages of antiquity and Cairy says they are still definite assets in his bag of tricks.

Semi-professional in the trade, Cairy served as president of the Magicians' Guild of America in 1940 and is now president of the Lansing guild of which he is a charter member.

Routine Gains Publicity

Some of his original routines have been published in Hugar's Magic Monthly and "The Phoenix," periodicals of the ledger-deman brotherhood. He said the highest such honor was being included on the list of 115 magicians of America whose special tricks and brief biographies were compiled by James G. Thompson in a book entitled "My Best."

Cairy's most noted act is what he terms a "memory gag." Some-one calls out 30 articles, with a number for each one, and he will repeat the list frontwards, backwards, or the article for any particular number. Although this one usually invokes cries of black magic, the answer is merely a photographic memory for which he is famous.

Burns \$100 Bills

His personal favorite is one of the commoner tricks of the profession which he developed into a specialty. Given a prized scrap of paper or large denomination bill (four 100 dollar bills have been supplied during his career) he tears it up, burns it, and then not only produces it intact, but buried in the center of a cigarette.

Dr. Cairy has made innumerable trips to Percy Jones hospital in Battle Creek during the past three years to entertain the veterans convalescing there. Because of his continued popularity with them, a reporter for the State Journal converted DVM, doctor of veterinary medicine degree granted at Iowa State college, to "doctor of veterans' magic," which title aptly fits MSC's versatile veterinarian.
