Faculty to Get 50 Temporary Houses

Recognizing the necessity to provide housing for faculty members, the Board of Trustees of Michigan State University has approved the construction of 50 temporary houses for the coming year.

The houses, which will be located on the campus, will be occupied by the first of August and will be used by the faculty and their families.

QUONSET HUTS ORDERED
Twenty-one of the structures will be of the well known Quonset hut design, each 20 feet by 36 feet.

The remainder of the emergency houses will be of the pre-fabricated style used in the Willow Run housing project and sent overseas to England and France to accommodate the bombed-out families living there.

The buildings will measure 24 feet by 34 feet and contain four rooms and a bath. They have been ordered from the Quonset company.

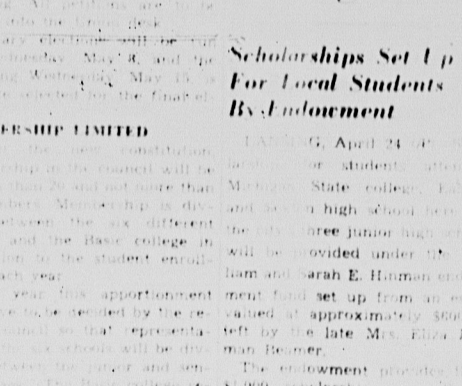

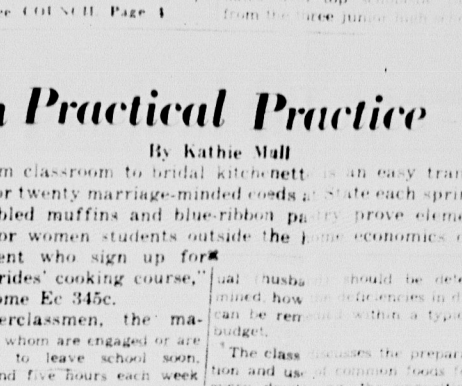

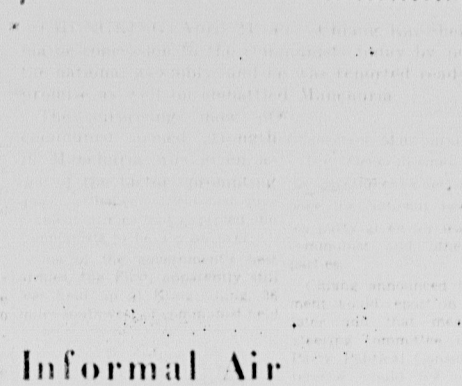

PORTLAND, Ore. (I.P.) — To give the people of Oregon an unbiased account of the needs and services of its higher educational institutions is the purpose of the newly formed United Citizens Higher Educational Council, officers of this newly formed body told the state board of higher education at a recent meeting.

The group consists of current officers of the state, mothers, alumni and student associations of the various institutions, plus some members at large. "We do not propose to be simply another pressure bloc which seeks particular or unjustified favors for one state activity," declared Ernest Hayscox, president of the University of Oregon alumni, in speaking to the board.

DETROIT, April 24 (I.P.) — Vol. of Jordan, president of the National Industrial Conference Board of New York, told the Association for Adult Education today that continued education is the only solution to the problem of infinite abundance and infinite expansion of power which the atomic age presents.

The age of electronic atomic in which we live today means essentially that it is more potential possible to make anything material, machines and energy out of anything at almost nothing anywhere in the world and in any amount at a rapidly diminishing cost in terms of time and labor.

He declared education would have to do what they could to help adults of this generation to adapt themselves to live in the world which already surrounds them, to shape it to their own free aspirations and purposes.

In their first seven games this year the Red Sox called out five runs from their star-studded 12-man staff and their combined effort which produced five victories, netted the exceptional earned run average of 1.29 a game.

This would have put Pete Fornari on third with the tying run with only one out. When Ace Ludwig drove out his long fly, Fornari would have crossed the plate and knotted the score.

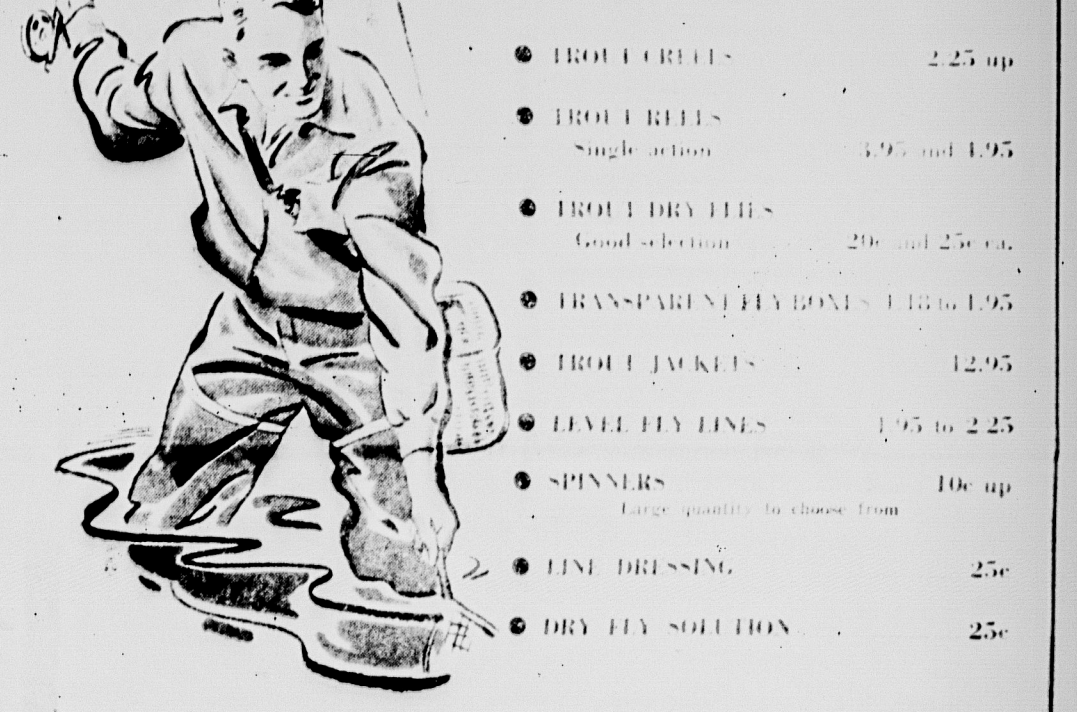

U.N. Acts On Spanish Question

Delegates Question Subpoena Power Of Proposed Five-Man Committee

NEW YORK, April 24 (AP)—United Nations delegates conferred in hotel rooms today in effort to chart a rough course on the controversial Spanish question, with indications pointing to eventual approval of the American proposal for a thorough investigation of the Franco regime.

Persons close to the delegates said many problems to be ironed out in connection with such an investigation and predicted another drawn-out discussion when the Security Council meets tomorrow.

One of the main questions to be discussed was the subpoena power of the proposed five-man committee. Delegates wondered whether they would have the full right to subpoena documents, delay into files of member nations and generally command enough authority to have sufficient material on hand for their report by the May 15 deadline.

The early Franco invitation was extended only to invited members having diplomatic relations with his government. Many nations are eager to such a stand would have a committee of five members.
