Tonight Col. John L. Whitelaw, commanding officer of the military department, will present capes and insignia of rank and service to corps sponsors elected by advanced ROTC students last Saturday. Ceremonies will take place on the parade ground in front of Demonstration hall at 5 p.m.

Joyce June Halbert, Battle Creek senior, named honorary colonel in the elections, will head a staff of honorary lieutenant colonels composed of Peggy Fox, Detroit senior, infantry sponsor; Marion Farmer, Saginaw senior, cavalry sponsor; Carolyn Powell, Port Huron senior, field artillery sponsor, and Barbara Christiancy, Grand Rapids senior, quartermaster sponsor.

Corps sponsors were last elected during fall term of 1942 and were installed at an impressive coronation ceremony attended by all students of ROTC. They reigned at all social functions of the military department throughout the year, and were honorary guests on the reviewing platform during spring parades. In 1943 advanced ROTC was discontinued and corps sponsors were no longer selected.

Due to lack of time and the comparative newness of the present advanced ROTC department, ceremonies during this term will be rather brief and informal.

Generalissimo Rejects Communist Proposal

Government Moving Delays Negotiations; Red Forces Stand Pat on Latest Demands

CHUNGKING, April 29 (AP) — General Marshall's last-ditch efforts to end the Manchurian warfare failed today when Generalissimo Chiang Kai-Shek refused stiffened demands by the Chinese communists.

Renewed attempts at settlement were expected after the government completes its current move to Nanking, but the confusion attendant upon the removal and the unrelenting attitude of both sides threatened an indefinite delay even in effecting the resumption of negotiations.

Chiang Rejects Program

Well-informed pro-government sources said Chiang had rejected the latest truce program because it would leave the communists in possession of battle-won Changchun and a major portion of Manchuria.

The communists, who a month ago were willing to settle for extension of some interior sectors and giving the government the major cities and the rail lines, were putting a much higher price tag on peace now.

Flushed with recent military successes, their leaders, according to reliable Chinese quarters, were insisting that all troops simply rest on their arms — a settlement which would leave them in possession of almost nine-tenths of Manchuria.

Marshall in Capitol

General Marshall, special American envoy who has been staying on in this provisional capital in a day-and-night attempt to halt the fighting, finally ordered his headquarters moved to Nanking Tuesday.

A communist spokesman confirmed this indication that the Chinese conference was in the

The repeated proposal called for:

1. Unconditional armistice.
2. Retention of the status quo until a general election could be held.
3. Reorganization of Manchurian troops under the already-accepted army unification program.
4. Discontinuance of transfer of government troops to Manchuria by United States ships.

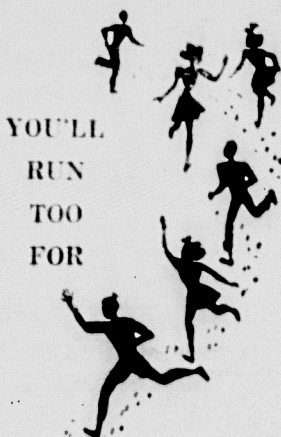

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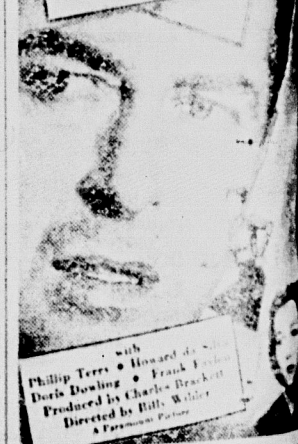

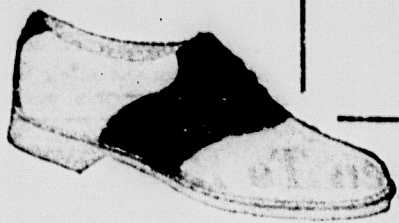

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Jim Funston Blasts Ace As Spartan Golfers Win

It was strictly "Jim Funston Day" at the Lansing country club golf course yesterday, as the Michigan State team won their second meet in three days, swamping the opponent university 20-4. Funston made a hole-in-one while shooting a sizzling 74.

The veteran AAF pilot returned to his number one job as the MSC links' team this morning after three years in the service.

In the 195-yard, par three hole, Funston, using a number two iron, scored his ace.

George Teale, Spartan number two man, defeated Bill Frey Marquette, 3-0; Bill Kent defeated Joe Steahr, 3-0; Jim Anderson tied Joe Spalkowski, and Ottmar lost to Ben Frey of Hilltoppers, 2-2 1/2.

Other events saw the Spartans make another clean sweep as teams of Funston-Anderson, Ottmar-Kent won by 3-0.

Against the Titans of Detroit, the Spartan squad swept all but one, which was tied. Funston took low honors with an 80. The score was 23 1/2-3 1/2.

Wells C Captures Softball Feature

Bob Bonnel scored on a passed ball in the sixth inning to give Wells C a 9 to 8 decision in extra innings over Wells B in the state softball league feature last night.

Bonnel was safe on an error when the inning and stole second and third to be in position to score, which he did without aid of a hit. Wells B scored the fifth to tie the score at and force the game an extra inning.

In another close game Wells A came from behind in the last inning to win a home run by Chuck Cotter edge Wells D, 4-3. Dave Peterson was the winning pitcher following four hits.

George Meade pitched a four-hitter for this third straight victory as Wells F defeated Wells E. The winners collected 10 runs off opposing pitcher Guy Peterson, including two doubles by Pete Towns.

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Spartan Jayvees Face Lansing '9' This Afternoon

Trying for their second win of the season, the Michigan State diamond Jayvees will take on the Motor Wheel independent team from Lansing at 4 this afternoon on the freshman field.

Last Saturday behind the three-hit pitching of Zeke Vogt and Jack Stallings, the junior varsity scored a 7-1 victory over Central Michigan.

All of the Jayvee runs were scored in the first three innings off the pitching of Paul Winter, Bearcat starting hurler.

Winters steadied and allowed but one hit in the second, but two infield errors and a walk gave the Jayvees three runs and a 5-0 lead.

In the third, outfielder Harry Paul singled and John Marakas was safe on an infield error. Jack Broadwell was hit by a pitched ball and Vogt walked, forcing in a run.

Cecil Morgan, mainstay of the Bearcat staff, replaced Winters on the mound and retired the side, but not before the Spartans made it 7-0.

Central Michigan ended the scoring for the game with a run in the fifth on a single, the first off Vogt, a walk and an error.

Morgan held the Spartans hitless until Carl Moss, who lead the Jayvees getting two-for-five singled in the eighth. He struck out 12 men in five innings.

Jack Stallings relieved Vogt in the seventh and allowed one hit.

Spartan Tennis Team Faces Two Matches During Weekend

The Spartan tennis team broke even in its two final matches of last week's road trip. On Friday, the netmen bowed to what assistant coach, "Jake" Dahlgren, termed an "excellent" University of Cincinnati team by a score of 8 to 1. They came back on Saturday however, and trounced the University of Kentucky 6 to 3 at Lexington.

Navy vet, Dave Phillips, supplied State's only win in the Cincinnati match, defeating Carvelas in the singles 3-6, 6-1, and 6-2.

The Spartan's stock was higher at Kentucky, Phillips defeating Meadors 6-4, 6-3. Hoover trounced Fears 6-0, 6-0, while Frans stopped Asbury of Kentucky 6-2, 6-3, and Malaga won from Meyerhok 7-5, 6-1. Tom Martin and Roger Cessna both lost their singles matches.

State won two out of three doubles matches from Kentucky. MSC's netmen engage Western Michigan college at Kalamazoo this Friday, and meet Indiana university Saturday.

Kobsmen Meet Detroit Team This Saturday

Trying to shake their losing ways, the Michigan State baseball Spartans are preparing for their contest with the undefeated University of Detroit club Saturday on Old College field.

So far the Titan's hold victories over Central Michigan, Selfridge field, and Michigan Normal against no defeats. Last spring State took Detroit four times, but this year Coach Lloyd Brazil is fielding a club loaded with veterans and lettermen.

Proof of the better Titan material is the fact that Jack Simmons, leading hitter for the 1945 outfit with a .323 average, isn't even broken into the starting lineup.

State's third set back of the season came last Saturday when the heavily talented Western Michigan nine went on a hitting spree and connected with 16 hits off of the three top Spartan pitchers, Robin Roberts, Joe Skrocki, and Keith Steffe, for a 9 to 1 victory.

The Bronco's scored nine runs as the Western Michigan pitching ace, Ed Rossi, held the Spartans to six scattered hits and his third victory of the year.

Ludwig Only Spartan Hitting

Bob Ludwig was the only Spartan who had any success against Rossi's southpaw pitching. Ludwig collected half the State hits by getting three safeties in four trips to the plate.

Ludwig also kept the Spartans from a complete shut out when in the fourth inning he tripped to deep center field and scored on Floyd Guest's single.

Hal Throop and Joe Cooper paced the Western Michigan assault in which every member of the Bronco team hit safely at least once, when they both got three hits in four times at bat.

Spartans Pace Drake Relays; Hang Up Sprint Medley Mark

Michigan State's cinder-men proved to be the dominant team in the Drake track meet last Friday and Saturday and would have won the carnival if the contest had been run on the usual team scoring basis, a survey revealed.

A Spartan track aggregation won places in all of the five relays entered, set a new varsity discus record and established the State varsity outdoor sprint medley mark.

Theta Chi Winner

In last night's fraternity tennis play Bob Butler and Jim Ellet won Theta Chi a hard-fought victory over Kappa Sigma's Dave Broderick and Pete Cole, 2-6, 6-2, and 7-5.

All four men meeting their first outdoor varsity competition this year, Spartans Al LaGrou, Mary Frazer, Jim Tanner, and Walt Mack set the MSC varsity outdoor sprint medley mark at three minutes, 32.2 seconds.

Won Two-Mile Relay Also

State also won first place honors in the university two-mile relay event when Zobel, Gibbard, LaGrou, and Mack ran the distance in seven minutes, 37.3 seconds.

In the other three relays, Coach Karl A. Schlademan's teams took third, fourth, and fifth places, which, together with Bruce Drynan's new MSC discus mark of 145 feet, 10 1/2 inches, piled up enough points to give State a winning team score.

The Spartan thirderade open their dual meet season Saturday against Ohio State at Columbus. Coach Schlademan's team defeated the Buckeyes during the indoor season 68 to 50, but placed third behind OSU and Purdue in the quadrangular event at Columbus on April 20.

Judge Grants Right to Build

Right to be issued a building permit for construction of an apartment near Bailey school was upheld yesterday by Circuit Judge Paul G. Eger in a decision rendered on the suit filed by Lansing contractor Arthur Teglund against the city of East Lansing.

Judge Agrees
Judge Eger said he was in sympathy with the citizens in the area and that it would seem that Teglund would be "reluctant to force himself into a hostile and unwelcome neighborhood." His decision was based on several cases, including two opinions from the highest courts of Rhode Island and New Jersey.

It was reasoned that the East Lansing board of appeals, which denied a building permit to Teglund on the basis of protests by the citizens, had no jurisdiction over the use to which the land might be put as long as the structure lies within the proper zone.

Complainers In Wrong
Judge Eger concluded, "These complaining have only themselves to blame," since they had been living within a zone slated for multiple dwelling since 1935.
