"Jews, Arabs Rise Against Report **Of Inquiry Group**

LONDON May 1 (P) -Britain bid today for United States military and financial aid to carry out a joint policy in Palestine, as an oproar of protest over the British-American inquiry committee report threatened to erupt in violence.

Jews and Arabs alike assailed the report, and Jerusalem dispatches said Arabs in Palestine proclaimed a symbolic ceneral strike for Friday in protest, urging neighboring Arab states join them.


