### A Cappella Choir Plans Program For Weekend

A program of contemporary choral compositions will be presented by the MSC a cappella choir directed by Dr. William Kimmel, at 7:30 p.m. Sunday in Peoples church. The program is sponsored by the Student Christian union and the music department.

Each part of the four-part program will be devoted to the works of one or two contemporary musicians of considerable fame. The first part will begin with "Introit" by Kimmel. Following it will be "Alleluia" and three choruses from "The Peaceable Kingdom," both by Randall Thompson.

Parts II and III include the works of famous Englishmen Ralph Vaughan Williams and Paul Hindemith. The choir will sing Williams' mass in G minor and "Six Chansons," song on original French poems of Rainer Maria Rilke, by Hindemith. The songs, like the poems, are entitled "The Doe," "A Swan," "Since All is Passing," "Springtime," "In Winter," and "Orchard."

"Out of the Cradle Endlessly Rocking" by Norman Lockwood will be sung by the MSC vocal ensemble. The poem from which the song was composed is by Walt Whitman.

Part IV is devoted entirely to the music of a noted Russian composer, Alexander Gretchaninoff. Two selections from his "The Great Vespers" will be sung.

### 'Sarge' Atchison Retires From Service After 27 Years In Michigan State ROTC

Corporal James Atchison stepped off a streetcar in East Lansing on Dec. 2, 1919, and couldn't see the town for the trees and the streetcar. He was the first man to arrive at MSC to instruct in the newly-inaugurated coast artillery branch of the ROTC.

A few days ago, advanced military students held a reception for Captain Atchison in recognition of his retirement. The ceremony took place in Michigan State's Union building just two stories above the former streetcar stop where Corporal Atchison had stepped off 27 years before.

#### Hannah's Teacher

Pres. John A. Hannah related the story of his instruction by Sergeant Atchison in the early '20s while a ROTC student at State. Col. J. L. Whitelaw, new commandant of ROTC and former deputy commander of the U. S. occupation zone in Germany, recalled how the captain (then a corporal) had taught him automotive courses in Fort Monroe, Va., in 1919.

Captain Atchison's years on campus saw State grow from a circle of buildings around Administration hall to what it is

now. Coeds moved out of Morrill hall and it was turned into classrooms. College hall (on the site now occupied by Beaumont tower) was torn down. Artillery guns, trucks, and material it had housed were moved across the Red Cedar to Demonstration hall.

#### Advances In Rank

During his stay at the college, Atchison has instructed both basic and advanced military students and regular promotions found him a technical sergeant at the outbreak of war in 1941.

The war sent his son, an MSC student, into the service and Sergeant Atchison shortly was commissioned a captain. But he remained the same easy-going instructor with the few basic ROTC students and the numerous air corps and ASTP trainees.

V-J day brought peace and old students drifting back to the campus. Many were surprised to see the old familiar sarge a full-fledged captain and just as up-used to it as they. And now, after 27 year of faithful service, many a student is sorry to see old "Sarge" go into retirement.





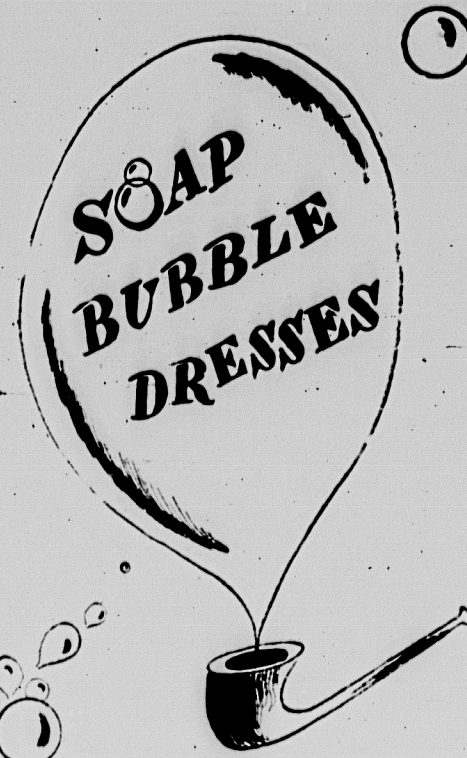
